There are now 7 wells pumping on the McKinney Farm, at Pithole, and 6 on the Morey Farm. Three new wells are going down on the McKinney form, and one old well is about to be started up. The pump-ing wells average from six to ten barrels per day each. On the Hiner farm, near Adams, ville, No. 1 is pumping 5 barrels daily, and No 2, 20 barrels. On the Haskell & Co. lease, Rooker farm, No. 1 continues to yield eighty barrels per day; No. 2, same lease, is nearly ready to test and has a splendid show. It is now 800 feet deep and has between thirty and forty feet of third sand rock. Phillips Bros., Figher Bros., and othor parties, have several new rigs up, in addi ion to the wells already started by them. Good reports are expected from the sit ter. ritory in 'bat vicinity soon.

SAD AFFLICTION. - About three weeks sgo, Mr. H. E. 
