To enable our readers to judge for themselves as to the villainously sensational nature of the reports of the late fire, we copy the following headings from the Rousseville Bulletin: "Petroleum Centre Again in Ashes—Seven Lives Reported Lost—Sixty Residences and Stores, and Innumerable Bagnios Burned—Fire Bugs at their Nefarious Work—Half-Crazed Courtzeans Swarming in Swarms upon the Streets"

There are now 7 wells pumping on the McKinney Farm, at Pitbole, and 6 on the Morey Farm. Three new wells are going down on the McKinney farm, and one old well is about to be started up.

As many of our citizens may not be aware of the fact, we are requested by Postmaster Miller to state that a mail is made up each morning and leaves on the 8:15 a. m. train going south, for all points on the Jameson & Franklin and Allegheny Valley Railroad.

We have heretofore made mention of the fact that Mr. F. W. Ames, the well known hardware dealer of Titusville, had disposed of his extensive business in that city to Messrs. Dame, Smith & Co.

The new firm are by no means strangers either to this community or the business they now undertake. Mr. A. A. Dame was for several years one of the proprietors of a hardware store at Pioneer during its palmy days, and afterwards a partner in the same business at Pleasantville in the well known firm of Dame, Seymour & Co.

Of Mr. H. P. Smith we might say, as the man in the story did, though from different reasons, "we cannot do justice to the occasion." Every one knows him and knows only well of him. He has been with Mr. Ames for the last five years, as much a trusted and valued counsellor in everything pertaining to the business, as manager and head clerk.

C. D. Angell and F. Prentice bought of C. S. Whitney his interest in the Angell, Prentice & Whitney tract of land of about 600 acres, near Foster Station, Venango county, Pa., for which they paid the sum of \$50,000; Mr. Angell taking two thirds, and Mr. Prentice taking one third of the purchase.

SAD AFFLICTION.—About three weeks ago, Mr. H. E. Harper, a well known oil operator residing at Kane City, had the misfortune to lose his wife, who was taken sick and died suddenly, leaving four children, one an infant and another blind.

Yesterday the blind boy died, and the remains were taken to Ohio to be buried beside the mother. Mr. H. has the sympathy of the entire community in that vicinity in his sad affliction.

During the late fire some party or parties used the axes and buckets belonging to the fire department and forgot to return them. There are four axes and twenty-four buckets missing. It is to be hoped that whoever has them in his or their possession will return them at once to the engine house or give information where they can be found.

COUNTY TAXES.—In 1869 and 1870, the county tax levied was thirteen mills. This year, on the new and increased assessment, seven mills will be levied which is about the same as thirteen mills on the valuation of 1869 and 1870.

The measles and scarlet fever prevail to such an extent at Kane City, that the school directors have been obliged to order the schools to be closed for the present.

An accident occurred on the Union & Titusville Railroad, on Saturday afternoon, occasioned by a freight car running off the track near Tryonville.

The ice is played out in Chautauque Lake. Rather an early spring. The boats will be in running in a week or two if the weather remains as it is at present.—James-town Journal.

The Painesville Advertiser says that there were conveyed, one day last week over the L. S. & M. S. R. R., some eighty mail bags filled with New Zealand newspapers en route for London, England. They came by way of San Francisco and the Union Pacific Railroad.

In the county of Chautauque, N. Y., more than sixty papers have started since 1820, of which only nine are in existence. Presuming the average capital sunk in each case to have been \$5,000, over a quarter of a million dollars is the total sum.

Six or seven new buildings are already in course of erection on the burnt district.—Several others will be commenced soon.

A new well on the Metropolitan tract, Cherrytree Run, will be completed in a short time.

From the Pittsburgh Gazette. The Ninth Annual Report of the Columbia Oil Company has been laid upon our table. It gives an exhibit of the affairs of the Company, which will be no less astonishing to the public than it is gratifying to the stockholders, who have regularly derived a handsome revenue from their investment ever since it went into operation.

And yet their prospects for greater results in the future are brilliant. At the close of the year they were pumping no less than forty-two wells, and the number is rapidly increasing, while the indications are strong that they will yield a much larger quantity of oil during 1871 than they did in 1870.

The managing editors, Croly, of the World, Reid, of Tribune, Blankam, of the Herald, and Jennings, of the Times, have each salaries of \$100 a week, amounting to \$5,200 a year. Of the editorial writers those on the Herald receive the smallest in New York, ranging from \$35 to \$50 per week; those on the Tribune are rated at from \$50 to \$60; two of the writers on the World are paid \$100 weekly; while on the Times the heavy writer receives \$150 per week, and others from \$60 to \$75.

Rothschild has issued a Russian loan of £12,000,000 at 8 1/2%. The Illinois State debt now amounts to only \$2,400,000. Governor Birch, of St. Thomas, is dead, and Judge Stakeman has been proclaimed Governor.

The strike at Newcastle-upon Tyne, England, has resulted in the success of the workmen. Seven hundred and fifty bales of cotton arrived at Norfolk last Saturday, over the Seaboard road. Mike Cavanaugh made two unsuccessful attempts at a suicide in Columbus, Miss., the other day.

Holland is suffering greatly from the ravages of small pox. A shock of earthquake was felt on Monday evening in New Hampshire.

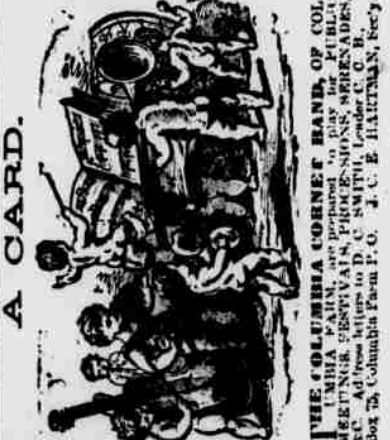
