The following is the decision rendered by Judge
McKim in the Torpedo case (22) day of the month,
1870, in the United States Circuit Court at Philadel-
phia. This case was argued three days by Charles
C. Roberts of New York, R. E. Lucas and S. A. For-
ster of Philadelphia, for defendants, and George
L. Smith, Charles C. Roberts and George H. Christy, of
Franklin, for plaintiff.

OPINION OF JUDGE CHIEF

As I write with diffidence I can only state the con-
clusions to which my mind has come after a careful
examination of this case.

The plaintiff has exhibited a patent dated
April 18th, 1868. This is prima facie evidence of
a good title, and puts on the respondents the bur-
den of proof that the patent is void in whole or in
part. I need not repeat the details of the case of each
year of the case, but I will state that the plaintiff
has adopted them as showing a title of invention which
is due to the plaintiff.

As the defendant on the part of the plaintiff is admitted,
and the question will be as to the validity of the
plaintiff's patent of April 18th, 1868.

It was after specification had been reduced to
writing, and after repeated experiments, that the
plaintiff succeeded in inventing the principle and
mechanism of the Torpedo, and the defendant is not
entitled to the benefit of his invention, and the
