A dispatch to the Pittsburgh Commercial dated Franklin, March 31, says of the new well at Reno:  
 "The excitement caused by the strike on the Milton Farm is increasing, and fancy prices are being paid for interests in the neighborhood. Major D. R. Irwin, of Franklin, sold half of the working interest in a fifty acre lease to-day to Fisher Bros. for twenty-two thousand dollars, and twenty-five thousand was offered for the other half this afternoon. The well is steadily increasing, and is pumping fully seventy barrels per day."  
 The Commercial dispatch is erroneous in many respects. Maj. Irwin had not disposed of his interest up to Saturday night, holding it at \$25,000, the highest price offered being \$22,000. Messrs. Lynch & Ernest, of Oil City, sold one-half working interest in this tract to Fisher Bros., of Oil City, Patterson & Dickey, of this place, and O. D. Harrington of Shamburg, for \$20,000, on Saturday last.  
 A loan of \$2,000,000 has been negotiated in London in aid of the reorganization of the Atlantic & Great Western Railway. The Trustees of the new organization are to be Gen. Geo. B. McClellan, Hon. A. G. Thurman, and Mr. W. B. Duncan. A large portion of the money is to be expended in placing the road in thorough repair. The road is to be sold under mortgage to-day, at Akron, Ohio, and is understood will be bought in by the new organization.  
 The late members of Mr. Chamberlain's Adult Singing Class are invited to meet in the Hall of the Catholic Institute, Thursday eve. next at 7 1/2 o'clock, to organize a musical reunion.  
 All others who will become useful and interested members are invited.  
 The peach crop in this State is reported to be very promising at present.

A man by the name of Thompson was stabbed in the head, and probably fatally injured, by a man named Sweeney, at Titusville, last night. Whiskey was the cause. About daylight yesterday morning a couple of burglars attempted to gain entrance to the residence of Mr. Barney Bosch, but were frightened off by the inmates. The proprietor of a saloon on Spring street was arrested on Saturday night for an unprovoked assault John Daly and Ed. Czizens, were assaulted Saturday night and frightfully pounded. About one o'clock yesterday morning an inebriated individual was arrested for firing a pistol in the street—Titusville Courier.  
 The last twenty-four hours has been fruitful of rowdiness and bloodshed. There was quite a number of cases of drunkenness, disorderly conduct and assault.—Titusville Herald.

 NEW WELL.—A new well was struck on the Lake farm, Cherrytree Run, on Friday night last, which is reported as yielding fully 30 barrels per day. The well is owned by Mr. Stoddard, of Columbia farm.

 There were three hundred and fifty-eight convicts in the Western Penitentiary yesterday, which is a less number than has been in the institution for four years and six months, and this number will be decreased one to-day by reason of expiration of term of service. There has been but one death in the institution within the past nineteen months, and but one preconcerted attempt to escape within the last year.

In proof of his assertion he relates how he poured kerosene on a dog, and set it on fire, just to have a little fun, as he was lonely during his wife's absence, and that dog actually ran under a barn belonging to him and laid there and set the barn on fire, though the man whistled to him to come out. It is enough to make a man loose faith in dogs.  
 Baltimore is to have a new female paper, to be called The True Woman. The name is to distinguish it from the other kind of women who are bowling around.  
 Many wonder what is the cause of the recent reduction of the price of refined oil, as the production is not so great as it was last year. It can probably be accounted for by the fact that many people who heretofore used kerosene have gone where it is not burned.  
 The three men for whose arrest warrants were issued Saturday, on a charge of assault and battery, and unlawfully exploding the Roberts torpedo in oil wells, were arrested at Pioneer, Saturday night. An examination is being had before the Justice to-day.  
 Griswold's Opera House, Troy N. Y., was destroyed by fire on Saturday. Loss \$50,000.
