In the torpedo infringement and assault and battery cases, which occurred at Plover a day or two since, and mention of which we have heretofore made, the three men arrested—A. J. Lewis, J. H. Abbott, and Charles Clark—are from present appearances likely to get their fill of law.—They were first arrested and fined for assault and battery on the person of Charles Blackford, an employee of the Roberts Torpedo Co. This afternoon they are to be tried for riot, and afterwards Blackford intends bringing an action for private damages, laying claim to the sum of \$300. Col. Roberts has caused the arrest of the owners of the leases on which the men were at work, for infringing on the torpedo patent. A search warrant discovered various implements used for exploding torpedoes in oil wells, concealed on the leases.

The suit for private damages comes off this afternoon before Justice Reynolds.

**LECTURE.**—Through the exertions of several of our citizens, the services of General Judson Kilpatrick, of cavalry fame, have been secured to deliver his great lecture entitled, "Incidents and Battle Scenes of the Rebellion," at Sobel's Opera House, on Wednesday evening, April 19th. The well known abilities of Gen. Kilpatrick as a lecturer is a sufficient guarantee of a crowded house.

Vandergrift & Forman, the well known oil shippers, have commenced the laying of a pipe line from Oil City to the new oil field at Reno. They expect to commence pumping the oil to Oil City by Friday of this week.

Some paper, an enemy to Detroit, set about a story that Detroit organ-grinders easily made ten dollars a day, and now every train that arrives there is loaded with organists and the hotels have been compelled to provide beds on the floor.

Venango County legislation comprises the following bills:

An act increasing powers of Justices of the Peace in Pleasantville.

Supplement to Pennsylvania Tubing and Transportation Company, authorizing two inch pipes instead of four inch.

Authorizing the erection of a foot and wagon bridge over Oil Creek at Blood Farm.

Giving pension to Daniel Keely, a soldier of the war of 1812, living near Franklin.

Increasing school tax at Pleasantville.

Regulating the collection of taxes in Venango county.

Consolidating Oil City and Venango City.

Repealing the road law of 1870, and restoring the old law.

Revival of ferry at Franklin, necessitated by the destruction of bridge.

Incorporating street railroad company at Oil City and Venango City, to connect the two places. Among the incorporators are Foster Mitchell, T. L. Morrison, and Vandergrift and Forman.

Of the new oil field at Reno the Oil City Register says: The striking of the Findlay well, on the Milton farm, near this place, on Wednesday night last, has created great excitement throughout the Oil Regions generally. This well is located about one mile from the A'lugheny river, at a point nearly opposite Reno, and some four miles from Oil City by present roads. The depth of the well is 900 feet, thickness of the third sand 31 feet—a hard pebble. The oil is 49 gravity, showing conclusive evidence of the existence of a large amount.—From the best practical judges, we are enabled to place the real production of the well at fully 80 barrels per day, while by some it is claimed 100. The well is located on a lease of some thirty-five or forty acres. The lease and well are owned by John McDonald, Assist. Supt. Petroleum Farms Association; Findlay & Hefferman, belier makers, and August Simon, merchant tailor, all of Oil City.

In our report of the new well on the Lake Farm, yesterday, an error occurred in the name of the owner. The well is owned by Mr. Henry Solday, of Columbia farm instead of Mr. Stoddard. It continues to yield fully thirty barrels per day.

Next Sunday is Easter, a day kept sacred by the Catholic and Episcopalian Churches.

Jacob Black's oil well, near Clarion, is now 1100 feet deep. Prospects good for striking oil.

The trout season has fairly commenced judging from the number of followers of old Isaac Walton, each one carrying his fishing tackle, to be seen daily, and all "going a fishing."

Miss Nilsson is to sing in Meadville, April 12th, whereat the Republican rejoices.

The Clarion county jail is without an occupant, and the Democrat pithily remarks that it is a good opening for some enterprising young man.

The Appy Concert troupe are billed for Jamestown, N. Y., April 8th. The company is said to be first class in every respect, having added several celebrated vocalists since its last appearance.

A man named Daniel Campbell, was run over and instantly killed by a train on the Philadelphia & Erie Railroad, at Lovell's Station, about three miles west of Corry, on Sunday morning. He was intoxicated at the time, and is supposed to have fallen from a freight train.

A stock of liquors belonging to Ely & Felten, seized by the U. S. Marshall, some time since, are advertised to be sold at Titusville, on the 6th day of April.

Blind Tom makes his farewell tour of the oil regions in a few days.

The Presbyterian Church and congregation of Warren have formed a Temperance Society, with the following officers: President, Hon. S. Johnson; Vice President, W. M. Lindsay; Recording Secretary, S. W. Waters; Corresponding Secretary, D. I. Ball; Treasurer, Mrs. L. D. Wetmore.—About seventy, old and young, signed the pledge at the first meeting.

The Presbyterians at Tidioute have secured the services of Rev. J. H. Edwards in which the Journal thinks them fortunate. They have also broken ground for a Parsonage to be located between the Church and the Creek.

The Oil City Daily Register comes to us in an enlarged and otherwise improved shape. We congratulate Bro. Johns on his success. The people of Oil City have now got a long needed institution—a first-class daily paper. They will consult their own interests by extending it a liberal patronage.

An extensive land slide occurred on the O. C. & A. R. R., at Miller Farm, at an early hour this morning. Both trains north and south were delayed, and the passengers had to be transferred.

Alluding to base ball matters the Titusville Herald recalls to mind some truthful reminiscences of the base ball clubs of Pitohole, as follows:

What has become of the base ball clubs of the oil region? We have not heard of a match this season as yet, when at this time a year ago, several fractures, sprains, and smashed proboscis, had marked the progress of the "national game" in this section.
