The engine house at Lady Hoops well No. 1, McCray farm, was destroyed by fire about 11 o'clock last night. Fire is supposed to have originated from sparks from the smoke stack lodging on the roof of the engine house. We did not learn the amount of the damage. The Lady Hoops well is owned by Titusville parties.

The Presbytery of Erie met at the First Presbyterian Church, Oil City, night before last, and continues its sessions up to and including to-day.

An Elmira boy's last meal was match heads.

Duluth intends starting a beautiful cemetery to attract invalids to that port of entry.

Miss Minnie Freeland, a school teacher at Oilopolis, met with a fatal accident on Friday afternoon while engaged in gathering flowers. The circumstances of the case were as follows. After school hours, Miss Freeland, in company with two little girls went to the south part of the village of Oilopolis for the purpose of gathering flowers, and while attempting to cross a small stream a few yards above the railroad track, upon a log which lay across it, fell upon the rocks beneath it in such a manner as to cause almost instant death. Her collar bone was found to be broken, though the distance from the log to where she fell could not exceed five feet. Miss Freeland laughingly made the remark to her companions as they approached the log, that "it would be a good joke if they should all fall off and get wet;" the two little girls were not hurt.

Miss Freeland's parents reside in Oil City. We learn she was a very estimable young lady, and much beloved by those who knew her.—Herald.

MONTHLY OIL REPORT.

Below we publish our usual oil report for the month of March. There has been considerable falling off over February, the McCray farm exhibiting the largest decrease, as will be seen by the following synopsis of the daily production for the past three months: In January the production of this farm was 978 barrels per day; in February, 565 barrels, and in March 313 barrels, the falling off in the month of March was 663 barrels per day. It is not proper to state however, that the production of the farm during the last of the month under review was greater than during the first.—This result was not attained by the striking of new wells, but by a natural increase of oil in the old ones. A portion of the other farms show a slight falling off since the February report, while most of the farms hold their own since last reported.

The following shows the decrease on the principal farms and tracts:

There was a slight increase on several of the farms on Cherrytree Run. The total average of the several farms and tracts as given in our table shows a daily production of 1,793 barrels, a decrease of 298 barrels since the February report.

Developing was not very lively during the month, being confined principally to the Cherrytree Run district. We note the striking of a thirty barrel well on the Lake farm, which is using considerable interest to be felt in that territory by operators. On the Sam Boyd farm developing is, looking up somewhat. This farm has been leased to A. H. Bronson, one of the owners, and it is his intention to drill a well on every five acres of the farm, commencing at once. The new well on Tarr Run is talked of considerably, but the result is not known as yet. On the whole, the work of developing during the present month promises to be quite lively.

On the first day of the month there was in iron tanks at this point 146,379 barrels, an increase of 7,428 barrels since March first. During the month the shipments from this point of crude and refined oil was 23,565 barrels, against 28,033 during February, a decrease of 4,468.

Included in our report will be found a table of the production of each lease on the McCray farm, also the amount of oil held in iron tanks by Mr. McCray.
