NICKEL -- Each denomination and kind of United States coppers, nick and bronze coins, separate and not mixed, will be redeemed when forwarded by express, prepaid, in even sums of \$20, to the United States Mint at Philadelphia. Copper cents prior to 1856, nickel copper cents from 1857 to 1864, and bronge cents since 1864, must come separately in even sums, as above. The cox, keg or package should contain a schedule of its contents, with the name and postoffice address of the party sending it, and stating, also, on what Assistant United States Treasurer the draft should be drawn. A duplicate schedule should at the same time he transmitted by mail to the United States Trensurer.
