He started for the door to throw it out, and his wife was about entering at the time received the entire contents on her person and was immediately enveloped in flames. The poor woman was burned almost to a crisp and expired shortly after in terrible agony.

The Cleveland Herald says:

About six o'clock Tuesday morning thousands of our citizens were aroused by one of the most terrific explosions that ever "shook up" things terrestrial in this locality. It proved to be the agitating house of Hussey, Payne & Co.'s oil refinery, situated on the canal, a short distance south of the Atlantic & Great Western Railway. It exploded without a moment's warning, and without any assignable cause, as far as known. The report was tremendous, and the concussion of the air was so great as to shake buildings two miles distant.

Over a thousand barrels of oil were in the agitator, and in a moment an immense volume of flame and thick black smoke told that the fire fiend was completing the work of destruction. Everything connected with the agitating house that would burn was destroyed. The flames spread to adjoining buildings, but their progress was checked by the efforts of the firemen. The oil and gasoline continued to burn several hours, two of the steamers remaining to protect surrounding property.

Very fortunately no loss of life or serious personal injury resulted from the explosion. Had it occurred two minutes earlier at least one life would have been sacrificed, as a workman had just left the building. Two or three men who were near by, were knocked down by the concussion, but were not seriously injured. Loss \$25,000.

The Oil City Register is again agitating the subject of building plankroads from the surrounding towns to that city, and urges the immediate commencement of a plank or macadamized road from that place to Petroleum Centre. We have frequently had occasion to speak of this matter and sincerely hope to see it carried through to completion.

The Spring examination of school teachers by county Superintendent Dale, commences April 24th. He will be at Petroleum Centre, April 27th, for the purpose of examining teachers and giving certificates to such as pass the examination.

Progress of the Northern Pacific Railroad.

The energy with which the building of this great thoroughfare is being pushed forward is an added guaranty of its early completion and its wise management. At the present date, the grading is nearly finished for 266 miles, from Lake Superior, through Central Minnesota, to the eastern border of Dakota; trains are running over 130 miles of completed track; the Mississippi River is bridged at Brainerd and once more joined to the Lakes by rail, and track-laying is rapidly progressing westward. By September next, trains will run to the Red River, and the grading will probably be far advanced toward the Great Bend of the Missouri River in Central Dakota.

In the meantime work has been commenced the present season on the Pacific coast; a large force of men is already employed in the valley of the Columbia River, in Washington Territory, and hereafter the work of construction will be pushed both eastward and westward toward the centre with such rapidity as the best interests of the road may justify.

Including its purchase of the St. Paul and Pacific Road, the Northern Pacific Railroad Company has 413 miles of road now in operation, and before the close of the present season the length of finished track will be at least 560 miles. The new highway to the Pacific is being constructed at the lowest cost compatible with first-class work.

The Venango Spectator advocates the claims of Franklin as the spot for oil-refiners to build new oil refineries, on the strength that Franklin is the centre of a large oil producing territory, and its nearest to the coal fields, consequently receiving fuel cheaper. The claim is good.
