

It is where speculation has been reduced to practice, when experiment has resulted in discovery and when that discovery has been perfected by patient and continued experiments, when some new compound, art, manufacture, or machine has been thus produced which is useful to the public that the party making it becomes a public benefactor and entitled to a patent. "And yet when centus and patient perseverance have at length succeeded, in spite of successful experiments who did or did or did not come very near making a discovery as we claims it. Every one who can invent an improvement or vary its form, claims a right to place the original discovery. We need not summons More, or Bianchard, or Woodworth to preve that this is the usual history of every great discovery or invention.
