LIQUOR SELLING AT ELECTIONS. - Among the bills recently passed by the Legislature is the following which having received the eanction of the Governor, has become a

used as a drink any spiritnous or mait liquors, wine or cider, or any other substance containing alcohol, on any part of any day ast apart or to be set apart for any general or special election by the citizens in or within any of the precincis, wards, townships, counties, or other election divisions or districts in the Commonwealth: Provided, That the provisions of this bill shall not be enforced a for the election polls are closed in the evening, or the sale of liquor probibited after that time.

Sec. 2. Any person violating the provisions of the first section of this not shall be deemed guilty of a migdemeanor, and shall

deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be subject to imprisonment in the proper jail of the proper county for a term of not less than ten days nor more than one hun-dred days in the discretion of the court, and shall also in addition to the above, be subject to a fine of not less than \$20, and not more than \$500 in the discretion of the court.


