The amount of building going on at the upper end of this place, in the burnt district is surprising in the extreme. Nearly the whole of one side of Washington street which a few weeks since was covered with blackened and half burned debris, is now re-built with an excellent class of buildings occupied by nearly all branches of trade, and the occupants appear to be doing a flourishing business. Such energy in the face of ruin by the fire fiend is commendable in the highest degree. Petroleum Centre is not dead yet.

ANNOYED.—A case of "evaporation," or living town between two days, occurred light before last in this place. John L. McClellan, who has been employed as telegraph operator in the office of the Pacific & Atlantic Telegraph Co., after collecting the month's bills due the Company, amounting to between \$400 and \$500, left on one of the evening trains. The young man left sundry small bills for liquor, cigars, board, &c., unpaid, besides borrowing what money he could from different individuals. We are not advised as to whether the Company intend using endeavors to secure the arrest of McClellan or not.

Fire.—About twelve o'clock to-day, the large engine house over the boiler in use for pumping the fire wells on the upper end of the Columbia farm, caught fire and was burned down. The fire originated from an overplus of gas from one of the wells running into the fire-box and causing an explosion. The boiler and machinery was badly injured. The loss, it is estimated, will not fall short of \$1,000.

By a dispatch received at 4 o'clock this afternoon, we learn that Phillips Brothers No. 3 Rocker farm, Filthole, started up yesterday and is doing 20 barrels per day.

Passenger steamers are now running from Erie to Duluth. The propeller Pacific, of the Lake Superior line left yesterday morning.

LIQUOR SELLING AT ELECTIONS.—Among the bills recently passed by the Legislature is the following which having received the sanction of the Governor, has become a law:

SECTION 1. Be it enacted, etc., That from and after the passage of this act it shall not be lawful for any person in this Commonwealth to sell liquors or give away to be used as a drink any spirituous or malt liquors, wine or cider, or any other substance containing alcohol, on any part of any day set apart or to be set apart for any general or special election by the citizens in or within any of the precincts, wards, townships, counties, or other election divisions or districts in the Commonwealth: Provided, That the provisions of this bill shall not be enforced after the election polls are closed in the evening, or the sale of liquor prohibited after that time.

SEC. 2. Any person violating the provisions of the first section of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be subject to imprisonment in the proper jail of the proper county for a term of not less than ten days nor more than one hundred days in the discretion of the court, and shall also in addition to the above, be subject to a fine of not less than \$20, and not more than \$500 in the discretion of the court.

A new Temple of Honor, has been organized at Corry. Judging from the amount of benzine punished by the representatives of that place who visit Petroleum Centre, they need a number more of such institutions before they can hope to succeed in the work of reformation.

Jamestown, N. Y., rejoices in the prospect of another railroad, which is to connect with the Dunkirk, Warren & Pittsburgh R. R., near Worksburgh.—This company has been organized with a capital of \$100,000, and ten per cent. paid in. It is expected the road will be in running order this fall.
