Elsewhere we publish a series of resolutions recently passed by the Young Men's Christian Association of this place, in regard to the keeping open of places of business on Sunday; also, in relation to the violation of the license law by selling liquor on Sunday, to minors, to persons of known intemperate habits and without license.—The same movement has been instituted by the Young Men's Christian Associations all over the State, and the intention is to see that the State liquor laws are carried out strictly to the letter and spirit as intended by its framers.

**NEW WELL.**—Phillips Bros. well No. 3, Rooker farm, Pitohole, was tubed day before yesterday, and started up at 20 barrels per day with good prospects of an increase.—The total depth of the well is 395 feet, and 18 feet of excellent sand rock was found. It is thought by many that the belt runs a little east of north and crosses the south east corner of that portion of the Judge McCalmont farm owned by our townsman, Capt. J. M. Kopler. New wells going down on that farm will soon test the matter.

**LATER.**—By a special dispatch from Pitohole this p. m., we learn that Phillips Bros. well No. 3, Rooker farm, is now pumping 20 to 25 barrels per day. Their well No. 4, same farm, is 12 feet in a coarse pebble sand rock and has a big show for oil.

A XVth amendment named Stark, was arrested yesterday afternoon and taken before Justice Reynolds, on a charge of the larceny of a quantity of lumber from a building being erected at the upper end of Washington street by Mrs. Maloney. The accused demanded a jury trial, and after a hearing in the case the jury rendered a verdict of not guilty but that defendant pay the costs.

The following preamble and resolutions were passed at a recent meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association of Petroleum Centre:

*Whereas*, It is well known that many of our business men in this place keep open their places of business on the Sabbath day; also, it is well known that there are numerous places in our town where intoxicating liquors are sold contrary to the statute laws of Pennsylvania; therefore,  
*Resolved*, That the Young Men's Christian Association of Petroleum Centre, will notify each of the business men of this place, who have been in the habit of keeping open their places of business on the Sabbath, that it is contrary to law, and hereby request them that hereafter they will close their places during the Sabbath.

*Resolved*, That it will notify by a circular that hereafter all persons in the place who are selling liquors without license from the court, must hereafter suspend the liquor traffic, and those that have obtained license from the court, are also notified that they must not violate their license by selling liquors on the Sabbath day, or to persons of intemperate habits, or to minors, as it is the intention of the Young Men's Christian Association of this place and the officers of the peace, to keep the liquor traffic within its lawful sphere, and we ask the co-operation of all order-loving citizens to assist in this undertaking.

The balloon, "Tallulah," is a monster airship, one hundred feet high and fifty feet in diameter.

**A SINGULAR DECISION.**—It is said that Commissioner Pleasanton, in the case of James S. McCray, Esq., has decided that when the owner of a farm has stored the oil produced from it, without selling during the year 1870, he is nevertheless liable for the income tax upon its value as if it had been converted into money.

It is said that Mr. McCray will be obliged to pay on his production of oil stored in tanks, about \$8,000. We understand the matter will be brought before the courts, and if the decision be sustained it will seriously affect many of the producers. There seems to be no good reason why the production of oil should be more burdensome than that of agricultural staples, to which, so far, the rule laid down by Commissioner Pleasanton has not been applied.—Titusville Courier.

Messrs. C. B. Seymour & Co. have started a new hardware store at Triumph.

Hydrotown, Crawford county, is to have a new hotel, at a cost of \$10,000. The Titusville Herald advocates the building of a street railway to connect the two places.

An act to vacate part of Twelfth street, formerly High street, in the city of Franklin, Venango county.

An act to enable John Hooper, trustee of the Orange Oil Company, to convey certain lands in Venango county free from liability to escheat.

An act to establish a ferry across the Allegheny river, at a short distance below the mouth of Ten Mile Run, Sugar Creek township, Venango county.

A supplement to an act to incorporate the city of Oil City, and to provide for the separate payment of the debts of the borough of Oil City, approved March 1, 1871, describing more accurately the city limits.
