We present to-day our usual monthly oil report April. It will be found as near correct as it is possible to get at the figures and facts necessary to make a report full and complete.

Death has entered the family of our townsman, Mr. George Magrane, and taken to his icy embrace a loved one. THE PRIZE FIGHT.—The Buffalo Com. mercial reports that a steamer will leave the city for Erie, whence it will start to the scene of the prize fight between Maco and Coburn, which is to come off on Thursday of next week. It fixes the scene of the fight at Long Point, which is one of the very best of reasons that it will not take place there. Cusick, the trainer of Maco, and Jim Coburn, brother of Joe Coburn, were in town from last Saturday until Tuesday. Whatever arrangements they may have made, were of course without any parade.—Erie Dispatch.

Considerable local and other interesting reading matter is crowded out on account of the extreme length of our oil report.

MONTHLY OIL REPORT.

We present to-day our usual oil report for the month of April. There has been less falling off during this month than for several months past. During March the greatest falling off was on the McCray farm being 252 barrels per day. During the month of April this farm exhibits an increase of 27 barrels per day. In March the production was 312 barrels per day, and in April 340 barrels. A number of the other farms show a falling off but the greater part hold their own since the March report was published.

The following table shows the decrease per day on the principal farms and tracts: Pearson farm, 6 barrels; Columbia farm, 47 " ; Niagara farm, 15 " ; Lake farm, 10 " ; Central farm, 5 "

The Dalzell, A. Boyd, Sam. Boyd, M E & ny Metropolitan, Brown, Cornen and other farms and tracts exhibit an increase in production over the month of March.—The total average of the several farms and tracts as given in our table shows a daily production of 1,780 barrels, a decrease of 63 barrels since the March report.

As we predicted in our March report developing was quite lively during the month of April and promises to be more so during the present month. On the Brown farm, Lake farm and Metropolitan tract, Cherrytree Run, a large number of leases have been taken and wells are to be put down at once, drilling having commenced on several already. On the Cornen farm four new wells are to be started at once. Leases are also being taken on the Buchanan farm, lying back of the Columbia farm, and the indications are favorable for good paying wells being struck on that farm. There are at present from 30 to 40 new wells going down or about to be started in this vicinity. On the whole the business of developing presents a favorable aspect at present, much more so than it has for several months past.

It will be seen that the Stevenson farm has been abandoned, having been flooded out by water. Included in our report for April will be found three or four tracts never before reported by us, located on Cherrytree Run.

The production of these farms has been taken into consideration in showing the decrease since last month.

On the first day of the month there was in iron tanks at this point 152,335 barrels, an increase of 5,956 barrels since March first.

During the month the shipments from this point of crude and refined oil was 27,324 barrels, against 23,565 during March, an increase of 3,759.

Included in our report will be found a table of the production of each lease on the McCray farm, also the amount of oil held in iron tankage by Mr. McCray.

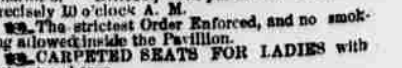
