#### Great Fire at Fagundas !

FORTY-SEVEN BUILDINGS BURNED!

NEARLY THE ENTIRE PLACE DE-STROYED!

We learn that yesterday afternoon, during the prevalence of a high wind, a fire broke out in an old shanty in rear of the Mc-Kinney Hotel, at Fagundas City, quickly consuming it.

From this point the fire spread to the Me-Kinney Hotel, and although the utmost endeavors were used by the citizens to stay its progress their efforts were futile, the flames aided by a stiff breeze spreading to the adjoining buildings and the whole street was quickly destroyed.

Among those burned out were Andrews bardware store, Smith's grocery store, Seymour's bardware store, and a large number

of business places, residences, &c. About forty-seven buildings in all were burned.

We are without further particulars of this disastrous conflagration.

We copy the following Armstrong Run oil news from the East Brady Independent:

The Clark well, on lease No. 10, (Clark farm reached the third sand rock on Friday, 28th ult., and at twelve o'clock on Monday, May 1st, the oil was tapped, and flowed about forty feet above the derrick. The depth of the well is 1,322 feet. It was tubed as rapidly as possible but owing to the great flow of oil it was not until six o'clock on Monday evening that the well was placed in proper working order. The product at this time was at the rate of twenty barrels per hour. At the present writing this promises to be one of the best producing wells in this section, and gives an increased value to the Clark farm. The new well was contracted for by our townsmen. W. E. Clark and S. B. Fundenberg and Dr. Harris and Capt. Schoonmaker of Pittsburgh. It is owned by these gentlemen in connection with others of Pittsburgh and we have no doubt they will continue to invest largely in this territory after baving made such a successful venture.

In reference to the other wells we might state that Dr. James has sold upwards of 12,000 barrels of oil from his well No. 1, realizing more than \$50,000 from the one

During the past month the James well No. 2, has sold 2,255 barrels of oil.

The Huma well sold as the product of one week 516 barrels of oil, and is now doing from 75 to 90 barrels dally.

The average production of the James No 1. is now 50 barrels per day.

The James No. 2 is doing 75 barrels. The Deely or Mollie Jennings well is yielding 35 barrels per day.

The Jennings Brothers well is yielding from 70 to 80 barrels per day. The Wolf well, on the Clark farm, lease

No. 9, is doing from 80 to 120 barrels. The Wallace well on the Clark farm is

producing about 45 barrels per day. The Meldren Reserve well was torpedoed on Tuesday, with the most successful results. Oil was thrown at immense distances

and the immediate flow was at the rate of

250 barrels per duy. The Clark well on the Clark farm is producing 60 barrels per day.
