The Destruction of Paris.

Almost too horrible for belief is the story told by the cable of the mad vandalism of the defeated Commune. But the news is abundantly confirmed. The madmen of Paris have turned in their fury upon the city they fought for.

The revolutionary madness of the Commune confound all precedent. For three centuries the Tuilleries have been the object of the admiration of successive monarchs. Catharine de Medici built it, Henry IV added to it, Louis XIII finished the long gallery connecting the palace with the Louvre, and under Louis XIV; Levan and D'Orbay added and removed to harmonize the great pile of carved stones.

Other buildings, famous in history, the pile of France and the wonder of the

world, have been laid in ruins. Of the old Louvre, one of the most splendid architectural monuments of France, unprofaned by modern attempts to rebuild and remodel, only a small portion has escaped the flames.

The telegraph reports another dreadful calamity in the coal mining region. Thirty-eight miners were buried in a shaft, and only twenty have been rescued alive.
