THE OIL MARKETS.

OFFICE OF PETROLEUM CENTRE DAILY RECORD May 30 1871.

The market continues firm, with little or no change in prices. Sales of 1,000 bbls in small lots at \$5.10. We quote at \$5.10a 5.15 to \$5.25 This being a holiday we are without outside markets.

The "Diamond Drill," a new invention, is attracting considerable attention. It is intended for drilling in mines and quarries, and for general blasting purposes on railroads, canals, etc. The first application of diamonds to practical rock drilling was made in 1863, by a civil engineer of Paris, and was first tried during the construction of the Mont Cenis tunnel, where it perforated granite, quartz, and the very hard calcareous dolomite with great ease. The "bit" or boring head is a hollow steel thimble about four inches in length, having three rows of diamonds, in their natural rough state, firmly imbedded therein, so that the edges of those in one row project from its face, while the edges of those in the other two rows project from the outer and inner peripheries respectively. The diamonds of the first mentioned row cut the path of the drill in its forward progress, while those upon the outer and inner periphery of the tool enlarge the cavity around the same, and admit the free ingress and egress of water, which is forcibly ejected into the hole, through the interior of the drill, by which the stone is both moistened and softened, and the borings carried away as fast as produced. The greatest depth that has been drilled with the machine was seven hundred and fifty feet, though it is claimed that it will drill to a depth of one thousand feet as easily as ten. At a recent test in Detroit the quickest drilling was through a stone a foot in thickness in two and a half minutes. The cost of the machine is about \$3,000, that of the "drill" or "bit" being merely nominal.

An Arkansas paper gives the outlines of a tragedy thus: A few years ago a minister in Sebastian county, Arkansas, was compelled publicly to rebuke a man for misconduct in church. The young man soon after went to Texas, where he remained until a few weeks ago, when he returned to Sebastian county. Visiting the church he found the minister engaged in preaching. After the minister came down from the pulpit, the man stepped up to him and inquired if he was the same one who had rebuked him on the former occasion. On receiving an affirmative answer, he drew a derringer and shot the minister in two places, killing him instantly.
