Our towneman, Dr. T. H. Stuart bes inveated a new fire preventive for dwelling houses, barns, stores, and all kinds of buildings. which, from its extreme simplicity and easiness of application, cannot fail of preventing many disestrous fires if put in practical nar. It consists of lengths of tubing or gas pipe perforated with small holes from an inch to an inch and three-quarters apart, or closer if necessary. The tubing is laid along on each side of the ridge board on the roof of the building, and also runs under the cornice on the sides and ends, running down one end into the cellar or yard, where it connects with the pires of the water works or any other works used for forcing water, and by the simple turning of the stop-cock at the hydrant, the water is forced through the tableg, comes out thro' the boles, and in an instant almost the entire building is drenched with water from roof to base. When it is understood that the great fire at Chicago was occasioned mainly, aller it started, from blazing firebrands borne by the wind to different sections of the city and setting fire to buildings at remote places from the first fire, the feasibility of Dr. S.'s plan can readily be seen. Had his apparatus been on these buildings they would have been "so thoroughly dreached that a fire could not have caught.

Dr. S. has applied for a patent on his new contrivance, and when the public once understand its merits, it will undoubtedly come into general use and favor as a pre-

A Year of Disaster.

We are truly in the midst of a year of disaster. A bare glance at a few detail a must stamp it as without parallel in modern history. The great fire at Colosgo; the confisgrations in the forests of Michigon and Wis consin, with their terrible sacrifices of life and property; the glowing praires of the Far West, pouring their cataracts of resistiess fame over bundreds of miles of desolated territory; the mountains of Culifornia and New Mexico, a secthing sea of fire; the freebet filling the rivers of Maine. sweeping off property by the million and lives by the score; the burricane rushing over the coast of Newfoundland ;the typhoon sweeping over China, litting up the lake like a plaything and burling it in deadly billows over many miles of coast. And with all this come cholers, the plague, fever, smallpox, and famine. A slight relief to this revolving picture is presented in the almost limitiess generosity of favored localities like ours localities which have escaped the serious calamity, and over which Providence has scattered His richest blessings. In these localities there have been poble, grand, impressive manifestations of sympathy in bebalf of the stricken and destitute.

The destruction of life and property by the great fire in the North-west is now said to have been much greater than reported. Men and women destroyed themselves, parents cut their children's throats, bundreds leaped into wells, and crowds perished by inches. It is doubtful if such borrible scenes were over before known in this country. They literally beggar description. It is reported that over 3,000 lives were lost.

For fast railroad time and quick work the following has probably never been excelled: During the late configration in Chicago two fire engines were sont from Bloomington, Illinois. In two hours and forty minutes from the time started, in a special train, over the Chicago, Alton and St. Louis Railroad, they were throwing water on the fire. The train made the run, 126 miles, in two hours and ten minutes, and the run from TBloomington to Joliet, eighty-nine miles, was made in eighty min-

In addition to this, the unutilized gas at the well, would, if applied, furnish fuel and light for ten more such buildings. The excitement is on the increase in these parts. A well was struck last week two miles east of here, which yields one bundred and ten barrels of oil daily, actual measurment.-Erie Dispatch.
