ARCTIC EXPEDITIONS .- The open Polar sea reported by the Atlantic cable as having been discovered by one of the German exploring expeditions has directed attention to the different companies of scientific men now employed in the arduous work of reachboys expected; we imagine they eved did ing the highest parallel of north latitude .-It appears that at the present time there are seven expeditions engaged in Arctic research-two from Germany, under the command of Recenthal and Payer respectively; one from Sweeden, consisting of two government vessels of war, one from Soutland, nathe first act, was one of the most beautiful der Lamont; one from England, under Leigh Smith; one from France, fitted out by Octave Pavy, and the Uniled States expedition, under Capt. Hall. The discovery of the ocean Polar sea by the German expedition brings to reccollection the second Arc tic exploration of Dr. E K. Kane, and his perilous overland journey to a point from which be saw, in the inaccessible distance the unfrozen waters of the circumpolar oc ean. The discovery of Dr. Kane, although credited by many persons, was not accepted as an incontrovertible fact. The accuracy of his observations has, newever, been established by the recent report from the German expedition.
