PITHOLE OIL TERRITORY.

—A correspondent writes us as follows in regard to the new Colorado near Pitohole: As you approach the large well from the Pitohole & Titusville plank road, you strike the original Brown lease, upon which is one well doing 120 barrels, with third sand rock 25 feet thick, that bring 15 feet more and of better quality than found in the old producing territory at Pitohole. Still nearer the large well on the same lease doing 150 barrels per day, with 27 feet of rock and not through the rock, showing that the rock improves as you near the big well. The flowing well is located on a north-east and south west line from Pitohole. This well is only three to five feet in the sand-rock, tools and cable still in the hole, and flowing 400 barrels per day. Owned by McLaughlin and Hugh O'Hare, and located on property owned by Dr. Shamburg. Going north-east we cross property owned or leased by Fisher Bros., small tract owned by S. Q. Arown and Geo. E. Anderson, farm of James Vanderlin, and one corner of heirs of Brownly tract.

Leases are readily taken on above tracts (such as will lease) at from \$500 to \$1,000 per acre bonus and one-half royalty, and no doubt exists but that it is in a line with the big well and consequently good territory.

On Thursday evening next, Mrs. Dr. H. F. Loges, will give select readings at Sobel's Opera House, for the benefit of the M. E. Sabbath School of Petroleum Centre.—Mr. I. E. Blake will furnish music for the occasion. A rare literary treat may be expected.

OIL AT LIMESTONE.—We learn from good authority that the oil indication at Limestone Catawagus county, New York is every day increasing, and that the prospects for a large supply of oil in that locality, are excellent. The Messes well is now producing some twenty barrels per day of heavy lubricating oil, of an excellent quality. This oil is much heavier than the oil found in the old oil regions of Pennsylvania, and sells for much more in market. Several wells are now being put down in that locality, and eastern capitalists are preparing to give Limestone territory a thorough test. There are three or four wells there now that produce considerable oil, daily, and the oil excitement in and about Limestone, is great. Verily, oil has its charms.—Warren Ledger

The mean temperature of the month of October, according to the memoranda of meteorological observations kept at the Library of the Young Men's Association in Buffalo, was 53.5 degrees; 1.7 inches of rain fell during the month. The temperature was 2 1/2 degrees warmer than the average for thirteen years past and the deficiency in rain was 1.8 inches, making the month one of extraordinary dryness.

PETROLEUM CENTRE, Nov. 18th.

At a meeting of citizens held at the office of S. Reynolds, Saturday evening, Nov. 18th, 1871, to take into consideration the report that a case of small pox existed in a house known as No. 19, Washington street, on motion J. M. Dickey was called to the chair, and R. C. Coulter appointed Secretary.

On motion a committee was appointed to procure a suitable house, located at some distance from town, to be used as a pest house should occasion require it, and that a committee of five be appointed to solicit subscriptions for the purpose of hiring a nurse to attend such patients, and making the building comfortable.

The Chair appointed as such committee Messrs. Reynolds, Walters, Sternburg, Waddell, and Healy.

Second—That a committee of five be appointed to make inquiries as to whether any cases of small pox existed in this community. Committee—T. S. Armstrong, Burton G. W. King, Coulter and McHugh.

Third—A committee to raise funds for the purposes mentioned above. Committee—Messrs. Dickey, Patterson and Reynolds.

On motion the meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the Secretary through the DAILY RECORD.

Before the meeting adjourned it was resolved that the Committee meet to-morrow (Sunday) evening, to investigate as to whether any cases of small pox existed.

The committee met as per adjournment at S. Reynolds' office, and resolved to secure the services of four physicians—Rosling, Stuart and Dr. Christie—to assist them in their investigations. The committee accompanied by the physicians proceeded to the house in question and after a thorough investigation reported that no smallpox existed at said No. 19 or elsewhere in the vicinity, and further that there was no cause for alarm whatever.

AN OIL WELL IN DICSON COUNTY, TENN.
The Nashville Banner of Wednesday says: Geo. Hudson, of this city, who has been boring for oil since 1865 at Dicson, thirty miles from Nashville and eight miles from White Bluff, on the Nashville and Northwestern Railroad, was rewarded for his perseverance about dusk on Monday evening. On lifting the drill the oil flowed to the surface in a large stream, soon covering the ground all around the well. The workmen procured lights with a view to plugging the well, but accidentally set the oil on fire, which was found very difficult to extinguish. It is said that the well will flow one hundred barrels of oil per day. Mr. Hudson has expended a large sum of money in boring wells and experimenting, and we are glad that he has achieved success at last.
