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

The following is the decision rendered by Judge
Oberlin on the Twenty-second (22d) day of September,
1860, in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals:
That the case was argued three days by Charles
A. Ketter of New York, U. S. Lines and S. A. Greene
of Philadelphia, for defendants, and George
H. Thompson, for plaintiff.

OPINION OF JUDGE OBERLIN

As I write with difficulty I can only state the re-
solutions to which my mind has come after a careful
examination of this case.

The complainant has exhibited a patent dated
20th of April, 1858. This is prima facie evidence of
a good title, and puts on the respondent the bur-
den of proof that the patent is void or worthless.

I need not repeat in this case what I said in the case of Green-
v. Peck, 12 Wall. U. S. 109, 182, but will

merely call your attention to the points which ap-
pertain directly to the present case.

As the infringement will be to the validity of com-
plainant's patent, I will not go into the question of

practice and of repeated experiments, that complainant succeeded in ever combining the process
and apparatus of the patent on the subject-matter
of his invention, and that the patent was valid
as far as any particular combination of great
value and merit.

It is well known that in order to get a good
patent, it is necessary to make some experiments
and to get some measure of success, in their speculations
as to possibility or probability of such discovery or invention,
many experiments have been effec-
tively tried, costing very little, yet failing short of the
desired result. They have produced nothing
but failures.

The invention which is perfected may not be
said to be the culmination point of many exper-
iments, not only by the inventor, but by many others
who have profited indirectly by the inven-
tor's experiments and failures of others, but it is
given them no right to claim a share of the benefit
of the product of the successful invention. It is wise
to give a wide scope to a patent, so as to cover
as much as possible of the subject-matter, and thus
make it available to the public.

It is usually the case, when any valuable dis-
covery is made, or any new machine of great utility is
invented, that the inventor of the public has been
turned to that subject previously, and that many
persons have been making researches and experiments.

These persons and mechanicians may have
some measure of success, in their speculations
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tively tried, costing very little, yet failing short of the
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
