COAL OIL ON THE WATER.—The Secretary of the Treasury informs the Special Treasury Agent at New Orleans that, according to sections 4 and 5 of the act of Congress of February 28, 1871, and the regulation adopted by the Board of Supervising Inspectors of steamboats at their last session, coal oil cannot be transported on passenger steam vessels; also, that crude and refined petroleum can be transported on passenger steamboats when there is no other practical means of transporting it, such as by railroads and freight lines of steamboats. When carried on a passenger steamboat the oil must be placed by the goods or forward main deck, and must not be above 110 degrees temperature.

The Bedford Inquirer says: On Saturday last, the bones of Hannibal, the big elephant who died and was buried near Centerville, this county, in May, 1855, were taken up and shipped to Chicago, by Mr. H. W. Boyd, Professor of Anatomy in the Chicago Medical College, there to be dressed up, put together, and occupy not a little space in the museum. It required four large boxes and a sugar boghead to contain the bones.
