A party of English capitalists, guided by the Hon. J. Ross Browne, are exploring the tub or bottom lands of the mouth of the Sacramento river, with a view of purchasing a large tract for the purpose of reclamation. It is proposed to apply the Hoidad system of dykes to the lands.

The New York Workingmen's Union is said to be threatened with dissolution. The painters, bricklayers, stairbuilders, and joiners have severally given notice of withdrawal. The grounds of dissatisfaction are the alleged perversion of the organization from its original design to political interests of a few of its members.

The grand jury of Chicago closed their labors by indorsing and commending the action of the Mayor in calling for the aid of Gen. Sheridan during the recent disaster, and warmly thanking the general for the efficient services rendered on that occasion.

The small-pox is rapidly increasing in New York. During the past week there were fifty-seven new cases of small pox in the city, and it is expressly stated that the disease prevailed not only among the poor occupants of filthy tenement houses, but among the most wealthy residents of the fashionable quarters.

There has been considerable yellow fever in New Orleans during the fall, and strange to say, instead of breaking out in the neighborhood of the French market, as usual among the inhabitants of the low "lago" slums, it took hold among the fashionable and well-to-do people. The first death occurred only a few days ago.
