REMOVAL.

The office of the Daily Record has been removed to the building situated three doors above the late location, directly opposite the McClintock House. Our friends are invited to call and see us.

Oil Item.—Well No. 107, Columbia Farm, was completed Wednesday of this week and commenced testing the same day, and is now yielding fully fifty barrels per day and increasing. The well is located on the lower end of the farm, on the bluff territory, and opens out a hitherto undeveloped portion of the farm. The well is owned by the Columbia Oil Company of Pittsburgh.

Well No. 208, same farm and owned by same parties, was completed yesterday, and is yielding about five barrels per day. It may be safely rated as a ten barrel well.—This well is located on the upper end of the farm, on the hillside above Petroleum Centre. Both of the above wells have a large flow of gas.

A new well was struck on the oil territory at the head of Tarr Run a day or two since, and is now yielding fully twenty-five barrels per day. The working interest is owned by Emery Bros., of Titusville. We have heretofore mentioned the Tarr Run territory as being A. 1 territory for producing purposes, and there is no doubt but a large extent of oil territory exists in that vicinity, and the striking of these wells cannot help but add materially to the business interest of Petroleum Centre. Good enough.

Our townsmen, Messrs. A. S. Haver and R. Dickerson, have secured a five-acre lease on the Harsh tract, about forty rods southwest of the McLaughlin well, the big flowing well at CashUp city, on the Pitchole oil territory. Their lease is located about fifteen rods from the Brown well No. 2, and but a short distance from another well, recently torpedoed, and which promises "big things" in the way of oil. The lease is located in a direct line between the new wells at CashUp and the old producing wells on the Dawson farm, Pitchole Creek. Particulars to be made an investment on safe territory at most reasonable terms, will do well to either call on the above parties or address them by mail at Petroleum Centre.

West Virginia Lubricating Oils.

The entire stock of Natural West Va. Lubricating Oils on hand at Volcano, Petroleum, and Parkersburg, at the present time, is 27,500 barrels. This includes all heavy oils of 30 degrees gravity, and under, and is nearly all held by about a half dozen parties. The stock of same gravities on hand two years ago was about 120,000 barrels. One year ago the stock has been reduced to 80,000 barrels, and six months ago it stood within a trifle of 40,000 barrels.—Although through the summer reduced oils were largely used in place of the Natural Oils, it still appears that the stock on hand of the latter, is steadily increasing. Taking the past as foreshadowing the future, within one year from this time, the stock on hand of Natural Oils will be entirely exhausted. It was anticipated that the production of heavy oils would be increased by the developments of the past summer but the products of the new wells consisted almost entirely of the lighter gravities, and the hopes of the early part of the season have not been realized. The present daily production of heavy oils is less than 100 barrels, with sales of perhaps, four times that amount.
