REMOVAL.

The office of the Daily Record has been removed to the building situated three doors above the late location, directly opposite the McClintock House. Our friends are invited to call and see us.

The Grand Duke Alexis is to pass through Erie on his way to the West. The distinguished visitor and suite will arrive at Buffalo, from Ottawa, via Niagara Falls, on Friday, December 15, and leave Buffalo, for the West, over the Lake Shore Railroad, at two p. m., on Sunday, the 16th of December, arriving at Erie at five o'clock. The Grand Duke and party will remain at Cleveland over Sunday, and will leave at two o'clock p. m. on Monday, December 18, for Detroit.

Tell you what, boys, but it's cold to day. At seven o'clock this morning, on the top of Stevenson Hill, the thermometer stood 12 degrees below zero in the open air, and at the same time, at the Central House, it stood five degrees below. The Arctic regions are no where at present.

Oil Creek froze entirely over at this point last night, for the first time since the year 1868.

Among the patents recently issued to citizens of Western Pennsylvania, is one to H. A. Hyle, Schamburg, for steam and water indicator.

This cold wintry weather is the time for our citizens to look out for fires, and show all keep their stove pipes, chimney flues, &c., in good order.

The interesting oil district in the vicinity of Franklin, is attracting considerable attention at present. Last week Dr. Egbert, of Franklin, purchased the Gallows tract, of 300 acres adjoining the Smith and McCamont farms, in an area well known for its oil-bearing capacity. The tract is considered good territory, and a large number of leases have already been given.

Last week a well was struck on the Smith farm, which is yielding about 10 barrels per day. It is owned by Geo. P. Smith, Esq., the proprietor of the farm. The Smith tract is very extensive, embracing all the land located between the Point at Franklin and Two Mile Run, south of the Titusville road, containing 900 acres, all of which is supposed to be good oil territory.

A well located on the Huff farm, Cranberry, owned by Mitchell, Whitaker & Co., of Franklin, was completed and tined on Monday last, and is yielding seventy-five barrels of oil per day.

A new well was struck on the river, opposite Reno, on Monday, and was tined on Tuesday, and is yielding fully one hundred barrels per day. It is 555 feet deep, has 18 feet of sand, of good quality, and is located on a piece of land owned by Maj. D. B. Irving, of Franklin, the working interest is owned by Munroe, Storey & Co., of Reno, who put down the well.

The Postmaster General will again recommend the abolition of the Franking Privilege, and Congress will probably again energetically proceed to act it alone.
