There are 16 producing wells yielding from 10 to 80 barrels each.—Some 12 or 15 new wells are drilling—four of them being in Clarion county. We were in error last week in stating there was a producing well on E. F. Hunter's land, in Ashland township. There is a well drilling however—down about 500 feet, with good indications. There is a strong flow of gas in all the wells. There was three new strikes recently not far from the old burning well—one of them producing 80 barrels. The oil is carried in pipes to Oil City. The best runs east and will soon develop a large amount of Clarion county territory.—Clarion Democrat
