The following is the decision rendered by Judge C. O. Sutherland on the 20th day of July, 1909, in the United States Circuit Court at Philadelphia. The case was argued three days, by Charles M. Keller of New York, by Lucas and S. A. Purvis of Pittsburgh, for defendants, and George Franklin of Philadelphia, and George H. Christy, of Pittsburgh, for plaintiff.
OPINION OF JUDGE GREENE.
I write with difficulty to you only state the conclusions to which my mind has come after a careful examination of the case.
The complainant has exhibited a patent dated 25th of April, 1896. This is prima facie evidence of a good title, and puts on the respondents the burden of proof that the patent is void or worthless.
I need not repeat my remarks in the case of Wood v. Roberts, 124 F. 2d 401, 100 Fed. 229, but will repeat them as summarizing a review of the case, and as a guide to the parties.
The infringement of the patent is admitted, the only question will be as to the validity of the complainant's patent of April 25, 1896.

NOTE—The passage referred to by Judge Green in his former decision on the 20th of July, 1909, adopted as applicable to this case was as follows:
"It is usually the case, when any valuable discovery is made, or any new machine of great utility is invented, that the attention of the public has been turned to that subject previously, and that many persons have been making researches and experiments. Philosophers and mechanicians may have in some measure anticipated in their speculations the possibility or probability of such discovery or invention; many experiments have been successfully tried, coming very near, yet falling short of the desired result. They have produced nothing beneficial. The invention which perfected many trials is said to be the culminating point of many experiments, not only by the inventor, but by many others. He may have profited indirectly by the successful experiments and failures of others, but it gives them no right to claim a share of the honor or the profit of the successful inventor. It is when speculation has been reduced to practice, when experiment has resulted in discovery and when that discovery has been perfected by patient and continued experiments, when some new compound, art, manufacture, or machine has been thus produced which is useful to the public, that the party making the discovery becomes a public benefactor and entitled to a patent."
"And yet when genius and pathos perseverence have at length succeeded, in spite of sinners and scoundrels, in the production of some new and valuable discovery, it is followed by reward. Every man of honor, able speculators, swindlers, and all other rogues of the profits. Every unsuccessful experimenter who did or did not come very near making a discovery now claims it. Every one who can invent an improvement or vary its form, claims a right to share the original discovery. We need not measure a man's or a woman's worth by the worth to prove that this is the usual history of every great discovery or invention."
"The present case adds another chapter to this long and uniform history."—2 Wallace, C. C. 26 ports p. 298
