MONTHLY OIL REPORT.

Below will be found our usual oil report for the month of November. The production shows a falling off of 34 barrels per day since the month of October. The McCray farm exhibits a decrease of 56 barrels per day; Central farm 7 barrels; Woods farm 2 barrels; Dalzell farm 6 barrels; Columbia farm 23 barrels, and other farms exhibit a slight decrease. The decrease is owing principally to the scarcity of water and the usual falling off occasioned by the cold weather.

The total average of the several farms and tracts as given in our table, shows a daily production of 1,565 barrels.

Developing is more active in this vicinity than it was during the month of October. During the month several new wells were completed which are yielding oil in paying quantities. On Tarr Run developments are progressing favorably and it promises to be the scene of active operations the coming spring and summer.

A new well was completed on the Hyde & Egbert farm, which is yielding 50 barrels per day. On Cherrytree Run developing continues at a lively rate, new wells being drilled on all sides. The oil belt appears to lead in the direction of Charley and Shaffer Runs at Oil City, and eventually the line of derricks will extend all the way from Cherrytree Run to Oil City.

On the Columbia farm the usual amount of developing is being done. Also, on the Cornes & Beers farm.

On the Gearing farm new developments are talked of. Other farms in that vicinity bid fair to be the scene of active operations before long.

On the first day of the month there was in iron tanks at this point 140,322 barrels. This includes all the oil in tank at this point.

During the month the shipments from this point of crude and refined oil was 20,177 barrels, against 33,691 during Sept., an increase of 2,792 bbls.

Included in our report will be found a table of the amount of oil held in iron tankage by Mr. Jas. S. McCray on the first of Dec. The first of Nov. the amount held by him was 130,082 barrels, and the first of Dec. 130,972 barrels—an increase of 892 barrels.
