One of the Prentice wells was torpedeed and the preduction increased from ten to 25 barrels daily.

The oil suit now pending before Judge Sterrett, in the Court of Common Pieus, in one in which a great deal of interest is manifested by others toen the parties to the suit. Without reference to the questionable status of such cases in the Courts, there is a pialn question for solution, which the july shou d be able to determine without protracted discussion The plaintiffs, who have been shown to have been parties to a combination to control and regulate the prices of oil, had a contract with the defendant for the delivery of two toousand parrels of crude oil, at thirteen and a baif cents per gailon, deliver, able in 1869. Towards the latter part of the year, in December, the price wasteroed up in some irregular way to about nineteen cents per gallon, and when the defendan was called upon for fulfilment of his contrac he declined to do so, believing that the prices then roling were illegitimate and "bulled" upon purpose to catch these who had contracts to fit. Future deve lopments proved his suspicions well founded, for in a few days, or immendiely after the let of January, 1871, the price of crude oil receded to its customery rate of twelve and a half to thirteen cents per gallon. To show that here was no good reason for the advance in be price of grude in December, the defended dealers in oil in the city. It was shown that during December the price of refined oil was only thirty to thirty-one cents per gallon, and that twelve to thirteen cents should, have been the ruling figures for crude, for the prices of each are governed by the other, just as the prices of wheat is governed by the price of flour. In offer words it crude oil was realty worth nineteen cents per gallon, then return oil was worth thir ty-seven cente per gation; but being worth only thirty or thirty-one cents, then grude was really worth but twelve to thirteen cents per gallon. With these facts before them, it is evident the jury can have but little trouble in arriving at a just conclusion.
