On Wednesday afternoon, a new well was struck on the Kating farm, southeast of Petersburg, on the Clarion river, which commenced flowing through the casing at the rate of 50 barrels per day, while the tools were yet in the hole. Seventy-five barrels of oil ran into the river and was lost for want of tankage. On account of the powerful vein of gas drilling had to cease until one of Grier's Oil and Gas Controllers was put in operation. The well is owned entirely by our townsman, Mr. Harry Derousse. It will probably prove a seventy-five barrel well.

**MONTHLY OIL REPORT.**

Below we present our usual monthly oil report for December. The production exhibits a falling off 69 barrels per day since the month of November, which is undoubtedly principally occasioned by the usual break downs incident to cold weather. The McCray farm exhibits a decrease of 14 barrels per day; Central farm, 18 barrels; Daisell farm, 3 barrels; Woods farm, 6 barrels. The Columbia farm shows an increase of 14 barrels per day, and the Hyde & Egbert farm, 10 barrels, and one or two other farms increase slightly.

The total average of the several farms and tracts as given in our table, shows a daily production of 1,496 barrels.

Developing was not very lively during the month. On the Hyde & Egbert farm two wells were completed, both of which are paying wells, and encouraging for old territory which nearly every one considered as played out and worthless. The new wells on Tarr Run are not completed as yet. The present month will probably witness important developments in that vicinity.

On Cherrytree Run developments have been retarded somewhat by the extreme cold weather, and operators are holding off in many cases for more favorable weather.

On the Columbia farm the usual amount of developing is being done.

On the first day of the month there was in iron tanks at this point 142,344 barrels. This includes all the oil in tank at this point.

During the month the shipments from this point of crude and refined oil was 12,237 barrels, against 29,179 during Nov., a decrease of 13,142 bbls.

Included in our report will be found a table of the amount of oil held in iron tankage by Mr. Jas. S. McCray on the first of Jan. The first of Dec. the amount held by him was 130,972 barrels, and the first of Jan. 133,444 barrels—an increase of 2,472 barrels.
