OIL NEWS.—The Overy & Brawley well E. of Martzburg on the Wm. Gibson farm is about a 3 barrel well; I understand it has been sold to a Meadville company.

The Lambing well on the Walker farm east of the Shaky well and distant about 70 rods completed last week is pumping sixty barrels.

J. A. Lambing and others struck a new well last week on the Wm Gibson farm about 100 rods south of the old well on the Robt. Campbell tract, which is pumping over one hundred barrels per day. South of this again about 70 rods, G. H. Dimick and McKinney & Nesbit have a well in the sand which promises to be one of the largest in the section, it is located on N. W. corner of the Disney farm.

A large number of wells will be completed within the next 8 or 10 days in the Bear creek region. John H. Galy has four on the east side of Bear creek nearly opposite the Lambing well on the R. Campbell farm. McPherson & Emery are drilling 2 and commencing 2 more. J. A. and J. M. Lambing are drilling 4 or 5. Angel and others are drilling a number. This territory is now well defined and operators can locate without much danger of getting dry holes. The Speer well north of the old Lambing well is very light, it is a little too far west to touch the belt. — [Eminton Sun.]

The divorced wife of Lord Edenborough, who died some short time since, many years ago disappeared from London society. It was said by some that she had married a Continental inn-keeper, by others that she had committed suicide. Some years later it was discovered that she had become the wife of the chief of a tribe of Bedouin Arabs, and had adopted their dress and way of life. Fullerton is the name of a new town being laid out by Mr. Fuller, late of Oil City, and Mr. M. Hulings, of the South side. It is situated a short distance this side of Foxburg, on the Allegheny Valley Railroad. Streets are being laid out and town lots are selling rapidly. Mr. Fuller intends erecting a large hotel to be called the Fullerton House, and to make other permanent improvements. A pipe line is to be at once laid from Antwerp City to that point, and the great portion of oil produced in the Petersburg region will be shipped via Fullerton instead of Foxburg. — [Oil City Register.]
