AN EXAMPLE.-Considerable interest is business is itself again. The Merrison well continues to yield oil in large quantities, as It did all through the suspension. Then its average daily production was about,150 barrels, flowing ; but now that it can be cleaned out and necessary attention given it, the production will be increased. The accumulation of paraffice in the well hinders the flow more than is usual, and it is very probable that this will decrease the production sooner than is expected. But the territory is good. As it is, this is perhaps the largest producing well in the oil regions .-Leases have been taken all over the farm and many wells are now drilling. Indeed, It seems to be the general opinion that too many wells are being sunk in the immediate vicinity. They will doubtless all find oll, but the territory will become exhausted sooner, and when wells are in such close proximity the liability of much property being destroyed by fire is far greater. As much oil will be produced from the few as from the many, without the expense of drilling and pumping the superfluous wells.

This is well known to be the case, and yet in the excitement occasioned by a big strike, in a new territory, it is always over looked, and when each operator has a well or two producing on his lease it is found to be more than the territory will bear. The Jamison farm is not the only example of this evil, but we find it in almost every terr ritory. Producers are well aware that it would be to their advantage to remedy this, and we have no deubt they will soon do it. The amount of money that is unnecessarily expended all over the oil regions in the working of superfisous wells might be writ-

ten in millions. This is a direct loss to producers, the cause of which certainly demands reform .- [East Brady indepedent.
