A PRISONER TAKES POISON -On Thurs, day night last, John Youle now undegoing confinement in the county prison for breaking juit, attempted to end his life by taking landanum. At eight o'clock in the evening be was discovered by another prisoner to be sick and vomiting. Mr. Nolan, the turnkey, went into his cell at 9 o'clock to lock up and found him crying. Upon being questioned Youle refused, at first to answer, but finallay admitted that he had tried to poison himself. He then showed the bottle which had contained the laudanum. He said be was tired of life, and that he had lived a bad life. It is not known how he procured the poison, but it was no doubt passed to him by some person on the outside of the jail. Youle says he got it under the pretense of having the toothache. He also acknowledged that he had tried to kill himself a few days before by taking morphine, but did not get enough. Antex_ amination of the bottle by the jail physician showed that Youle had taken about two ounces of laudanum-enough to kill ten men-but the over-dose, by making him vemit, saved his life. Youle is still under the doctor's care, but out of danger.

There are only nine prisoners now in the county jail, eight of whom are serving out sentences. This is the smallest jall population we have had for a year.

The uniners employed by the Maple Grove Coal Company at Raymitten organized a strike on the 18th of September. They were receiving \$1.40 per ton and demanded an increase of ten cents. On Saturday last the strike was ended by the company giving an advance of five cents per ton and work was resumed on Monday. About 85 men are employed in the company's mines.-They now get \$1,45 per ton.
