

The following is the decision rendered by Judge McKean, at May Term of the Circuit Court in the above case:

In the Circuit Court of the United States, in and for the Western District of Pennsylvania—E. A. Roberts vs. Nicholas Geyer—No. 1—May Term 1872—In Equity.

November 14, 1872. Bill filed and subpoena issued.

Suit pending and notice of application for preliminary injunction reserved.

November 14, 1872. Motion for preliminary injunction denied, and the court being duly advised in the premises, the injunction prayed for, and service done, is hereby denied.

December 1, 1872. Judgment rendered, and on the 1st day of January next, and served personally on the parties.

December 1, 1872. Rule to show cause why defendant does not appear to show timely attachment obtained out from the contempt in refusing injunction and duly served.

December 24, 1872. Rule notwithstanding in this case, and to be held, after argument of counsel and court, the time for filing bill of exceptions, to which the defendant was entitled, is suspended, and the time for filing bill of exceptions is extended to the 1st day of January next, for which time the defendant is given leave to file his bill of exceptions.

January 1, 1873. Judgment affirmed.
