

MEETING OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE WARD BOUNTY COMMITTEES.

An adjourned meeting of the representatives from the different Ward Bounty Committees was held last evening, at the Board of Trade rooms.

Mr. Stephen Colwell, chairman of the special committee, reported the results of his mission to ascertain the quota, stating that Major Gilbert, Assistant Provost Marshal General, had been applied to, but could give no information to the committee from what the authority. He had promised to write to the committee the information, believing it was right that it should be imparted.

The President presented a statement from the City Controller, showing the number of men credited and paid bounty to, from each Ward, as follows:

First, 42; Second, 44; Third, 46; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 59; Sixth, 68; Seventh, 59; Eighth, 34; Ninth, 25; Tenth, 20; Eleventh, 9; Twelfth, 12; Thirteenth, 14; Fourteenth, 23; Fifteenth, 20; Sixteenth, 10; Seventeenth, 12; Eighteenth, 10; Nineteenth, 17; Twentieth, 14; Twenty-first, 11; Twenty-second, 18; Twenty-third, 14; Twenty-fourth, 23; Twenty-fifth, 14; Twenty-sixth, 10; Twenty-seventh, 12; Twenty-eighth, 10; Twenty-ninth, 17; Thirtieth, 14.

The credit by Congressional Districts is to the First, 107; Second, 80; Third, 163; Fourth, 72; Fifth (a portion of which only is in Philadelphia city), 18; making in the aggregate precisely 600.

The credit to the city of Philadelphia, without District or Ward, is 52, and the entire number who have received bounty is 4,004.

Mr. Henry Carey Lea, from the Citizens' Bounty Fund Commission, stated that they had received no information of an official kind, but a gentleman had said that the following figures had been received from Washington, showing the quota by districts to be as follows: First, 1,400; Second, 1,200; Third, 2,400; Fourth, 1,400; Fifth, 1,000. Mr. Lea stated further, that under the call of the last year, for 200,000 additional troops, the quota of the city would appear to be 13,333 men. In view of these facts, and the difficulty of obtaining money, he thought it would be well to fix the bounty at \$25 per man.

Mr. Joseph R. Fry was in favor of having a graduating scale of payments, so that those who enlisted earliest should receive the largest bounty. In proportion as to time, as follows: To all enlisting prior to the 15th inst., \$35; between the 15th and 20th, \$25; from 20th to 25th, \$20; and \$5 per day off between the 25th and the end of the month. This gave rise to a long discussion, and was followed by Mr. Fry.

Mr. Lea submitted the following which was adopted:

Resolved, That in view of the new call for men, and of the difficulty of raising money, the bounty be fixed at \$25 per man, and after the 1st inst. on motion, a committee be appointed to see that the bounty is paid to all who are entitled to it.

Mr. William Struthers was elected Treasurer of the organization.

Adjourned until Tuesday evening next.
