An adjourned meeting of the representatives from the different Ward Bounty Committees was held last evening, at the Board of Trade

Mr. Stephen Colwell, chairman of the special committee to ascertain the quota, stated that Major Gilbert, Assistant Provost Marshal General, had been applied to, but could give no information to the committee from want of authority. He had promised to write to the Provost Marshal General for permission to communicate the information, believing it was right that it should be imparted. The President presented a statement from the City Controller, showing the number of men credited and paid bounty to, from each

Ward, as follows: First, 42; Second, 44; Third, 46; Fourth. 11; Fifth, 59; Sixth, 68; Seventh, 369; Eighth, 343; Ninth, 25; Tenth, 299; Eleventh, 94; Twelfth, 142; Thirteenth, 174; Fourteenth, 262; Fifteenth, 262; Sixteenth, 101; Seventeenth, 120; Eighteenth, 180; Nineteenth, 19; Twentieth, 194; Twenty-first, 11; Twenty-second, 185; Pwenty- hird, 104; Twenty-fourth, 326; Twenty-

ifth, 72; making a total of 3552. The credit by Congressional Districts is to the First, 167; Second, 80; Third, 163; Fourth, 72; Fifth (a portion of which only is in Philadelphia county), 18; making in the aggregrate The credit to the city of Philadelphia, with-

out District or Ward, is 32, and the entire num-

ber who have received bounty is 4,091.

Mr. Henry Carcy Lea, from the Citizens' Bounty Fund Commission, stated that they had received no information of an official kind, but a gentleman had said that the following figures had been received from Washington, showing the quota by districts to be as follows: First, 1,469; Second, 1,722; Third, 2,139; Fourth, 1,400; and Fifth, 700. Mr.Lea stated, further, that under the call of the 1st inst, for 200,000 additional troops, the quota of the city would appear to be 13,333 men. In view of ets, and the difficulty of obtaining money, he thought it would be well to fix the

bounty at \$25 per man. Mr. Joseph R. Fry was in favor of having a graduating scale of payments, so that those who enlisted earliest should receive the largest bounty, in proportion as to time, as follows: To all enlisting prior to the 15th inst., \$35; between the 15th and 20th, \$25; from 20th to 25th, \$20; and \$5 per day off between the 25th and the end of the month. This gave rise to a long discussion, and was withdrawn by Mr. Fry. Mr. Lea submitted the following which was

adopted:

Resolved, That in view of the new call for men, and of the difficulty of raising money, this meeting resolve that each Ward of the city reduce the bounty to \$25 per man, on and after the 4th inst.

On motion, a committee of six was appointed to wait upon Major-General Hancock and invite him to address such meeting as may be desirable, to promote enlistments. The following gentlemen were appointed: Hon. Judge Hare, Sheriff Thompson, George N. Tatham, William Fry, T. W. Price, and William D. Lewis.

Mr. William Struthers was elected Treasurer of the organization. Adjourned until Tuesday evening next.

SECTION I The Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadel him, do ordain: That the May or be and he is hereby authorized to borrow on the City of Philadel has, do ordain: That the May or be and he is hereby authorized to borrow on the credit of the city from time to time, as may be required by the City Treasurer, such sums of money as may be required to aid the enlistment of Voinnteers for the service of the United States, not exceeding in the whole the sum of One Million, Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars, for which interest, not to exceed at the rate of six per per cent. Per annum, shall be paid half-yearly, on the firs, days of any and January, at the office of the City Treasur. The principal of said loan shall be payable and paid at the expiration of thirty years from the date of the same, and not before without the consent of holders thereof, and certificates therefor, in the usual form of such certificates of City Loans, shall be issued in such amount as the lenders may require, but not for any fractional part of one hundred dollars, for irequired in amounts of the hundred or one thousand dollars, and it shall be expressed in said certificates thereof are payable free from all taxes.

SEC. 2. Whenever any loan shall be made by virtue hereof, there shall be, by force of this ordinance, annually appropriated out of the income of the corporate estates, and from the sum raised by taxation, a sim sufficient to pay the interest on said certificates; and the further sum of three-tents of one per cent. on the par value of such certificates of issued shall be appropriated quarterly, out of the income and taxes, to a sinking fund, which fund and its accumulation are hereby specifically piedged for the redemption and payment of said certificates.
