OPERATIONS IN FLORIDA. Boston, Feb. 6 .- A private letter from ICharlotte Harbor, Florida, Jan. 20th, states that a number of Union troops, under Gen. Woodbury, had arrived at Ponta Rosa, the obect being to cut off a large supply of beeves which the rebels were taking from Florida at the rate of 150 er week

The expedition is guided by Lt. Crane, who was Commissary in the U.S. Army during the war in Florida, and who resided there until the rebellion broke out, when he was obliged to leave on account of his Union sentiments.

Lieutenant Crane says that he intends to take possession of Fort Myers, on the Caloosahatchie river, and make it a rallying point for the Union men as well as a good base of operations.
