A N ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE AN ADDITIONAL LOAN TO AID THE ENLISTMENT OF VOLUNTEERS.
SECTION: The Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelebia, do ordain: That the May or be and he is hereby authorized to borrow on the credit of the city from time to time, as may be required by the City Treasurer, such sums of money as may be required to and the enlistment of Younteers for the service of the United States, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Two Millibus, Dollars, for which interest, not to exceed at the rate of six per cent, per annum, shall be paid half-ready, on the first days of July and January, at the fiftee of the City Treasurer. The principal of said four shall be payable and paid at the expiration of thirty years from the date of the same, and not before without the consent of holders thereof, and ceruficates therefor, in the usual form of such ceruficates of City Losus, shall be issued in such amount as the lenders may require, but not for any fractional part of one hundred dolliers, for trequired in amounts of dye hundred or one thousand dolliers. lay or be and he is hereby anthor; zed to borrow on

SEC. 2. Whenever any loan shall be made by virtue hereof, there shall be, by force of this ordinance, annually appropriated out of the income of the corporate estates, and from the sum raised by taxation, a sum sufficient to pay the interest on said certificates; and the further sum of three-tenths of one per cent, on the par value of such certificates so issued shall be appropriated quarterly, out of the income and taxes, to a sinking fund, which fund and its accumulation are hereby specifically pledged for the redemption and payment of said certificates.
