Activity 13. Neither slavers nor invaluntary same

Article 13. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the offender shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their invisitation. ject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.
