



A N ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE AN AD-MENT OF VOLUNTEERS. SECTION! The Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelchia, do ordain: That the Major be and he is hereby authorized to borrow on the City of Philadelchia, do ordain: That the Mayor be and he is hereby authorized to borrow on the credit of the city from time to time, as may be required by the City Treasurer, such sums of money as may be required to aid the enlistment of Younneets for the service of the United States, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Two Million, Dollars, for which interest, not to exceed at the rate of six per cent. per annum, shall be paid half-yearly, on the first days of July and January, at the office of the City Treasurer. The principal of said loan shall be payable and paid at the expiration of thirty years from the date of the same, and not before without the consent of holders thereof, and certificates therefor, in the usual form of such certificates therefor, in the usual form of such certificates therefor, in the usual form of such certificates the lenders may require, but not for any fractional part of one hundred deligrs, for frequired in amounts of five hundred or one thousand dollars, and it shall be expressed in said certificates the said loan therein mentioned, and the interest thereof are payable free from all taxes.

Whenever any loan shall be made by virtue hereof, there shall be, by force of this ordinance, annually appropriated out of the income of the corporate estates, and from the sum raised by taxation, a sum sufficient to pay the interest tents of one per cent, on the par value of such terrificates so issued shall be appropriated quarterly, out of the income and taxes, to a sinking fund, which fund sud, its accumulation are hereby specifically pledged for the redemption and payment of end certificates.
