THE OCCUPATION OF JACKSON CONFIRMED.

A Sharp Fight at Clinton.

The Enemy Defeated and Driven.

Interesting from Washington City.

To-Day's Proceedings in Congress.

THE WAR IN MISSISSIPPI. CINCINNATI, Feb. 15 .- A despatch from Nashville to the Gazette gives official news that General Sherman entered Jackson, Miss., on the 5th. The enemy offered but little resistance and was supposed to be falling back over the Pearl river. It is believed that the rebels are receiving reinforcements from Palton.

There is no news from General Thomas's front. The veterans are rapidly returning to the army.

THE FIGHT AT CLINTON. CAIRO, Feb. 15 .- The reports from the rebel papers of a fight with a part of Sherman's forces, near Clinton, Miss., on the 4th inst., are confirmed by officers who have just arrived from that point.

Our troops charged on a rebel battery and lost 15 killed and 30 wounded. Among the latter was Col. Rogers, of Illinois.

The enemy was driven from its position, and our forces proceeded towards Jackson.

THE WAR IN ALABAMA.

NEW YORK, Feb. 15 .- A fight occurred at Lebanon, Alabama, on Wednesday last, between Lewis's squadron and our troops. According to the Selma Reporter, "The enemy (Federals), 9,000 strong, subsequently abandoned Lebanon and retreated toward the Tennessee river. The rebel force is said to have numbered 400 only."
