adopted with modifications, namely: spirits distilled and sold, or distilled and removed for consumption or sale previous to the first of July next, of first proof, to pay in addition to duties payable on licenses, a duty of sixty cents per gallon, and upon all liquors which may be distilled after the passage of this act and sold or removed for consumption or sale on and after first day of July next, and previous to the first day of January next, sixty-five cents a gal-lon; and all liquors which may be distilled after the passage of this act, and sold or removed for consumption or sale on and after first of January next, seventy-five cents a gallon. The modifications are from twenty to sixty-five

cents, and from eighty to seventy cents. Another point in controversy has been settled, namely, on distilled spirits, imported from foreign countries previous to first of July next, of first proof, forty cents additional a gallon; on all such spirits imported from foreign countries on and after first of July next and previous to first of January, duty forty-five instead of fifty cents a gallon, and on all such spirits imported on and after first of Jan.next, fifty cents instead of sixty cents a gallon.
