A memorial from the Philadelphia Board of Trade has been forwarded to the Legislature, praying for the enactment of the following:
A further supplement to the act relating to Limited Partnerships, approved March 21st, 1836;
Section 1. Be it enacted, the. That it shall and may be lawful for any special partnersh make his contribution to the comion stock of any finited partnership he may become a member of, in-oash, provided, or merchandise, contributions are made in goods, or merchandise, the same shall be first appraised under outly, or affirmation, by appraisers skilled and well versed in the business to which the said partnership pertains, who shall be appointed by the Court of Common Pleas of the county in which such partnership is to be carried on. And provided also, That in the certificate as now required by law, the nature and value of the said goods shall be fully set forth and described. And provided factor, however, we have a marchandise. nature and vaine of the said goods thall be fully set for hand described. And provided fartier, however, That in all cases where merchandise shail, wholly or in part, have been contributed instead of cash, as the capital of the limited partnership, it shall be so stated in all the publications made, as required by the act to which this is a supplement.

sec. 2. A special partner may loan money to and advance and pay money for the partnershi, and may take and hold the notes, dratts, acceptances, and houds of or belonging to the partnership and advance and pay money for the partnership, and may take and hold the noise, dratts, accept, ances, and bouds of or belonging to the partnership, as security for the repayment of such moneys and interest, and may use and lend his name and credit, as security for the partnership in any business thereof, and shall have the same rights and remedies in these respects as any other creditor might have. He may also presented sales, purchases, and other business for the partnership; but no business so negotiated shall be binding upon the partnership until approved by a general partner.

SEO. 3. The business of the partnership shall be conducted under a firm, in which the names of all the general partners shall be inserted, except that when there are more than two general partners, the firm name may consist of either two of such partners, with the addition of the words "and company;" but the said partnership shall put p on some conspicuous place on the outside, and in front of all its chief places of business, a sign, on which shall be painted, in legible English haracters; all the names in full of all the members f said partnership, stating who are general, and who are special partners. who are special partners.
