CHESS AT THE MERCANTILE LIBRARY. The portion of the Reading Room of the Mercan-tile Library, which is devoted to Chess, is spanned by an arch, for which we desire to suggest an inecription. It has been suggested to our own mind in our frequent visits to this popular resort, by witnessing the miserable prostitution of the noble old game which has been brought about by the Management, in providing Chess tables as an additional attraction to the Library.

Very stringent rules were established for the regulation of the Chess Room, and in some rare cases these rules have been enforced, as in a recent instance, when we endeavored to borrow a sett of the men for an evening, for the use of the Telegraph Committee. But these instances are very rare. The present state of Chess at the "Mercantile" is simply this. Many of the men have been stolen, and two setts are now so mutilated, that only seven of the nine tables can be used.

This is bad enough, but still worse is the practice of permitting a shoal of small boys, who would be much more profitably amused by painted blocks, or jack-straws, to monopolize the tables, moving the pieces about at random, ignorant of the simplest rudiments of the game, and apparently quite unconscious of the ridiculous attitude which they occupy in the eyes of even the most moderate Chess players.

We are perfectly aware of the trite answer that will be made to this complaint, that we must not expect to find first-rate players in boys. We know that well enough. But we have a right to expect some little modesty amongst boys when they are permitted to mingle with grown men, and we have also a right to expect that in such a public Chess room, there should be manifested at least some little regard for the rules of Chess, and some little disposition to learn the game on the part of those who appropriate so constantly a large portion of the Chess tables. No one is more ready than we to lend a helping hand to the young student of Chess, but the class we now speak of, are not students of Chess in any sense of the word.

The evil of which we complain, and to which we call the prompt attention of the Managers, is a real and a serious one, and should be remedied at once. While it is tolerated, Chess is only damaged, not promoted by the existence of the Chess Room of the Mercantile Library, and we feel sure that every real lover of Chess who frequents the Rooms will approve of any reasonable action of the Board looking to a correction of this evil.


In what we have written we desire distinctly to disclaim any personality whatever. We do not know the name of a single one of those to whom we have referred, and everybody knows that the Chess Editors of the EVENING BULLETIN are the most amiable and patient of human beings. We are a trio of lambs, so to speak, but so long as we stand guard over the interests of Chess in this community we mean to commend or condemn, without favor or fear, whenever the occasion seems to require it.

We are aware that we shall be heartily scolded for what we have now said, but we have been through so many scoldings in the last five years, that we have become rather callous to it. We try to be right, and a review of our course satisfies us that we have generally succeeded in the effort. And this brings us back to the motto that we

would inscribe upon the arch of the Mercantile Library Chess Room. It is to be painted in very big letters, and is to read thus: "OH, CHESS! WHAT CRIMES ARE COMMITTED IN THY NAME ?"

Since writing the above, we learn that the stolen pieces has been replaced by new ones. We trust that they may be handled more honestly than their
