The affair is regarded as a very strange, if not high-handed, proceeding, and may lead to considerable trouble.

Panama advices of the 18th, are as follows: No news from Mexico. The French frigate D'Assas is keeping strict blockade at Acapulco. She has seized a quantity of contraband of war. I have given to this case the consideration which it demands. There is no evidence before me proving that the persons assembled near this office did so for the purpose of attacking the individual or individuals engaged in the printing office; but rather to express their disapprobation of the conduct of certain persons who were there engaged at work. Had it appeared that these defendants acted in concert with others and at their instigation for the perpose of attacking the prosecutor, nothing would he as severe as it would be just. In disposing of this case, it seems to me that our duty will require us to express our decided disapprobation of that course of conduct upon the part of a number of me which led to this assault, and so to punish, these defendants, that, while we shall be merciful (perhaps too much so), we will also vindicate the law. As this is the first case of the kind which has occurred, perhaps the necessity for an example does not exist; nevertheless, we shall impose a punishment, which will, I hope, act as a warning, not only to these defendants, but to all who suppose they can intimidate others or trifle with the saw, eitner as individuals or while acting in concert, and whether the object in view is a simple expression of cisapprebation or leads to an assault, which, although not an aggravated one, is, revertheless, an assault and battery.
