TUESDAY, MARCH 15, 1864. THE GREAT PHILADELPHIA FAIR. It is very evident that for nearly three months the principal business of Philadelphia will be the Great Sanitary Fair. It is to be a grand Carnival such as the city never before witnessed; an all-absorbing subject for every body, and it will be carried out on such a splendid scale as to become the grand festival from which to date for many years to come. Philadelphia looks back in her past to the Meschianza, the great Butchers' Procession of 1828, and the Washington Centennial of 1832; but it is very evident that the Great Fair of 1864 is destined to eclipse the united attractions of all our local celebrations or public events of

Apart from the main object proposed, that of relieving the soldiers in such trials or sufferings as government is unable, with the best intentions, to reach, there is yet another great public benefit to be derived from this Fair which the community has been quick to appreciate. The more generally it is made known that the attractions of the festival are to be extraordinary, both as regards extent and splendor, the greater will be the throng of visitors, and the more will our city be benefitted. If all that has been planned be fully carried out, there is no more reason why so many as a million visitors may not be attracted to the city during the fair.

There are probably very few persons among us who are not willing to aid, but there are many who do not know how to make their ability available. A few words of advice may not be out of place to these. Let every one, to begin, lose no opportunity of informing every friend residing out of the city, as to the excitement now prevailing in so many circles on the subject; of the vast collections of goods and money being made; of the exhibitions and festivities of every kind which are to render the city and the fair brilliant during two entire weeks, and in fact, of the entire attention of the whole community to the one absorbing event. Write to every one, informing him or her of the galleries to be opened, the plays, concerts, tableaux, museums, and other attractions which are to be prepared on a splendid scale for the great fair-carnival.

As there is scarcely a person in the community above ten years of age who is not capable of aiding the fair in some way, it is evident that all who are willing should take pains to direct and organize the labor of others. Every. thing is acceptable. All varieties of needle. work, goods, food, fancy wares, no matter how triffing in value, will be gladly accepted.

Look over your old garrets for documents of every kind, written, let us say, fifty years ago; for newspapers, pamphlets, books, engravings, including political and other caricatures, oldfashioned ornaments, carvings, arms of every description, Indian dresses, pipes, furs, arrowheads, toys, vases, Chinese objects, coins, canes, odd furniture and sporting gear. Thouhigh prices could they once be brought under he notice of collectors.' There is probably a bundred thousand dollars' worth of such miscellanea stored in every ward in the city, the owners of which would only be too glad to do some real good by giving it away to the Fair. Those who can give only time and labor, should at once apply to a member of one of the many committees, and receive instructions as to what to give or to do.

Young persons, who can write a fair hand, should prepare letters for the Fair Post Office, or they may contribute neat MSS. volumes; copies of poems, with large colored capital letters, such as are eagerly purchased for gifts at fairs in Europe. Those who can knit or sew can make nightcaps for the soldiers, stockings, tobacco bags and, in fact, any variety of stitched or woven fancy work. Drawing, painting, modeling, turned or leather work, will be all acceptable. It is hoped that flowers will form a prominent feature at the fair, and that every one who can contribute any will do so.

Let every one ascertain at the Sanitary, 1307 Chestnut street, the names of the different committees, and if disposed to contribute either labor or objects, address a note to that effect to the Chairman.

The literati, who are disposed to aid, may remember that it is proposed to issue a newspaper during the Fair, and that short and piquant articles, apropos to its columns, will be thankfully received. All such contributions may be addressed to the care of the Chairman of the Newspaper Committee. Those who are willing to lend or give any pictures or statues for exhibition or sale, should address the Chairman of the Committee on Arts and so on. In short, the city of Philadelphia has promised to itself "a glorious time, a magnificent time," and one unprecedented in its annals. All that is necessary is to organize the labor willing to be employed, and to make known to every one the vast extent of the preparations projected. The whole city, it is to be hoped, will wear for two weeks an air du fête, and be beautiful with garlands, music and flowers. As June is the rose-month, there would, indeed, be little difficulty in carrying out a very extensive scheme of adornment, in a city so famous as Philadelphia for its floral and other natural attractions.

THE GETTYSBURG MEMORIAL.

This patriotic enterprise is going ahead swimmingly. The gentlemen who have the matter in charge can readily enough procure a sufficient number of subscribers to the stock to secure the portions of the field set apart for purchase-and in fact contracted for -but time is pressing, and cash is needed to meet payments which will fall due upon the first of the coming month. It is, therefore, desirable that the subscriptions should be pushed forward as rapidly as possible, for a gracious work done promptly is doubly gracious, and delays will embarrass the officers and the local and general committees, who are not only "working for nothing and finding themselves," but who have made themselves responsible for the payments falling due. Let it be remembered that every subscriber of ten dollars becomes part owner of the glorious field of Gettysburg, and he aids to that extent in securing the spot forever in the condition in which it was left by the conflicting armies of Meade and Lee. Pennsylvanians should be jealous of allowing any but themselves to incur the cost of perpetuating this grandest of monuments of a grand event, and they should subscribe promptly and liberally before the patriotic honor is seized from abroad. In addition to the handsome subscriptions already made by the citizens of our State, we have seen upon the lists of subscribers the names of high officers in the army and navy, and of such distinguished citizens as Edward Everett. Let loyal Pennsylvanians push this noble enterprise through, and let them do it promptly and out of their own resources, before the patriotic citizens of other States take upon themselves a large share of the cost of securing our own great battle field as a monument of the greatest of modern conflicts.

BENEFICIAL ORDER.

Adjutant General Lorenzo Thomas having revoked his order authorizing the impressment of negroes into the army, General Rousseau, commanding at Nashville, has issued an order which prohibits such impressments within his District, unless there shall be imperative necessity for such proceeding. He also invites the loyal law-abiding people of the District, including those who have, in good faith, taken the " Amnesty Oath," to re-build their fences and re-stock their farms, and grow crops, with the assurance that they will hereafter be protected in the possession of their property, which will not be appropriated for the public use. unless by competent authority, and not then without fair compensation being paid to the owner. Nashville and vicinity are gradually recovering from the effects of the disastrous occupation by the rebels, and this order of the Commanding General can but hasten its progress of resuscitation. Insecurity has had much to do with the continued depopulation of semiloyal districts of the lower States, and assurance of protection from the authorities to the timid residents of other sections of the country similarly situated, would be of great advantage

McCLELLAN AND LEE.

We have never alluded in these columns to the report that just after the battle of Antietam a claudestine meeting took place between Gen. Lee and Gen. McClellan. A certain Francis Waldron was the author of the story, which was so wholly incredible that we declined to give currency to it. A letter from Washington to the New York Commercial disposes of it as follows:

follows:

"The charge that General McClellan had a secret interview with General Lee after the battle of Antietam, has prived to be a fiction of a disordered brain. The person who made the astounding statement is a Mr. Francis Waldron, a Marylander, who is a schoolmaster by protession, and who has, in years past, been somewhat addicted to drink. He has been in customy of the Serg-antiatarms since wednereday afternoon, but refuses to make under oath the statement which he has furnished for publication. He has also other stories of a marvellous nature, one of which is that he was for some time employed night and day by feoretary Chase in along is the preparation of a new figural scheme, which has no foundation in Inct."

The New York Tribune, which first published Wa'dron's story, now announces that Waldron confesses that he was drunk when he told it. It is strange that those who repeated sands of articles of this kind, which may seem time that it was a drunken man's story, and of no earthly use to the owners, would bring therefore wholly unworthy of belief.

FRAUDS ON THE GOVERNMENT. It is reported that the Government "hat its eye on the Navy Agents in two or three Northern cities," who are reported to have been committing "frauds of enormous dimensions." If there be any truth in this, we trust the Government will put its strong hand, as well as its eye, on the guilty parties. That men entrusted with high offices should, at a time like this, when the people are taxed enormously to carry on the war, take advantage of their official position to rob the Government, is disgraceful and criminal even beyond ordinary disgraces and crimes. If there be any truth in the report referred to, the people will not be satisfied until the frauds are exposed and the guilty men are punished.
