A SUPPLEMENT TO AN ORDINANCE OF A ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO ALL OF THE PAYMENT OF BOUNTY TO VOLUNTEERS UNDER THE PAYMENT OF BOUNTY TO VOLUNTEERS UNDER THE RECENT CALL OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES."

SECTION 1. The Select and Common Councils of the City of Philiadelphia do ordain, that the further sum of one million of dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated to continue the payment of bountees to volunteers, under and in pursuance of the said ordinance to which this is a supplement; payments to be made and warrants to be drawn in the manner in said ordinance provided.

Sec. 9. That in the judgment of these Councils it wiil be inexpedient to make any further appropriation for said purpose, beyond that made by the first section thereof, until the quotas of the City of Philiadelphia, and the credits to which it is entitled, are settled and ascertained.
