CREDITS FOR ENLISTMENTS IN THE NAVY.

WAR DEPARTMENT, PROVOST MARSHAL

Greeral's Office, Washington, March 23d,
1864.—Circular No. 11.—The following opinion of
the Hon. William Whitung, Solicitor of the War

Department, is published for the information and
guidance of all officers of this Bureau:

In regard to credits on the quotas of wards,
towns, &c., of persons enlisting into the naval
service or marine corps of the United States,
(Section 9 act of Congress, approved February 21.
1864, amendatory of the Enrollment act.)

Opinion.—Of those persons who, since the 24th
of February, 1864, shall have entered the naval
service of marnne corps of the United States, some
are, and others are not, by law, to be credited to
the quotas of towns, wards, &c.

No persons enlisting is to be credited to any quota; unless he is 'liable to service,'' under the enrollment act, whether he has on hean enrolled. Thus, if an alien, just landed in a scapor,
is erroneously or improperly enrolled, he owes
the United States no allegiance, and is not, against
his will, liable to military duty; and if he enlists
in the navy, caunot lawfully be credited to the
quota of the town where he happened to enlist.
So, if a citizen, who, by reason of his age or fr
any other cause, is not liable to military service
under the laws of the United States, should be by
error enrolled, and should then enlist in the navy,
he cannot be credited to any quota, because the law
allows credits only for seamen who are 'cliable to
service' under said act.

When such credits are to be given, they must be
given to the towns, wards, &c., 'an which said
enlisted mariners, &c., were or might have been
eurolied, and were actually liable to duty under
the enrollment act.''

The Fire-Alarm and Police Treegraph and we understand that the builders, Messrs. John K. Kennard & Co., are now here, ready to commence the work. In most of the cities adopting the telegraph the wires are placed upon the tops of houses, firmly secured by iroa brackets, thus relieving the streets and avenues of the nuisance of telegraph poles. At first a prejudice was felt towards allowing the wire to be thus placed, but now that has been dissipated by the fact that these wires furnish a protection against atmospheric electricity, as each connection made with the earth acts as a lightning rod. In view of these facts it is hoped the wires of our fre-telegraph will be placed upon houses out of sight and out of danger. As Messrs, Kennard & Co. have built all the lire-telegraphs now in operation, and own all the patents covering the machinery used in their construction, we doubt not they will give us a model telegraph tor the Capital of the Nation.—Washington Star, March 15, 1864.
