Our financial success is the wonder of the world, and our military success will make our country the favored spot of all the earth and the asylum of the oppressed of every nation, where merit and honest labor will receive their ruil reward. where merit and honest labor will receive their full reward.

Mr. Herrick (N. Y.) charged the Administration with the greatest crimes which could be committed. They have no desire or intention of bringing the war to a close. They are making no calculation for this, but are shaping everything for the prolongation of the contest. If they haddesired to restree peace and the Union they might have done so long ago. Every soldier killed was murdered by the Administration, and every dollar spent wis comity. It was the first and most imperative duty of the Administration to bring the war to a close. If they failed to do so they were morally guilty of treason. Our military operations had produced barren fruits. The ruling minds of the dominant party keep the war alive as the best means of prolonging their power. He contended they have no right to interfere with the domestic institutions of the South, and this was done by the insane worshipers of the negro. As for the Democracy, they would close the war as soon as they could, compatible with honor, irrespective of the Presidential election. The salvation of the country depends more upon the ballot-box than upon our armies. Some hope may be expected from General Grant of satisfactory military results, but with the abolition party political domination is held superior to the restoration of the Union. Re-elect Lincoln, and the war will continue throughout his second term, the plunderers and contractors still prosper, while the public debt will become too great to be borne.

Mr. Harrington (Ind.) argued that before the Emancipation proclamation there was passed no Conscription law, the hideous feature of which it was now sought to conceal by the plea of military necessity. The President and his wick-d advisers had unblushingly broken taith with a generous and confiding people. Armed power was paralyzing and overshadowing the rights of the people. The war was prolonged to pull down the white man to an equality with the negro, and for this the President uses remorselessly the blood of the nation. The acts of the President mark the path which led to the French Revolution, which produced its Murats and Robespietres and their coadjators, who, in the name of universal libery, disgraced humanity. Under this Administration there was no hope of compromise. He saw no way but to keep and supply our armies in the field, and hold the mal-administration of the President responsible before the people. The Union and the Constitution must be restored, and this coald be done only by the people. He declared the ordinances of secession void, and that the constitution and laws of seceeded States were in full force, and only needed the removal of treasonable obstractions to resume healthy operation.

Mr. Harding (Ky.) asked why, after spending three thousand million dollars and sacrificing eight hundred thousand lives, we have no peace! The answer would be found in the fact that the Administration and its party have betrayed the cause of Union and become a revolutionary carry, making war not to restore the Union but to erect a different one of its ruins. He charged shey had volated their solemn pledges, and themse

accused and self-condemned of trampling on the Constitution of his country.
