

PENNSYLVANIA LEGISLATURE.

HARRISBURG, March 29.

Petitions.—The following petitions among others were presented:

Mr. Connel, from the Board of Trade for increase in the rate of legal interest from 6 to 7 per cent.

Mr. Johnson, from the State Agricultural Society against any change of the investment of the fund from the Centre County Agricultural College.

Mr. Connel introduced an act relative to the Fulton Coal Company, as follows:

Whereas, the capital stock of the Fulton Coal Company, formerly the Northernumberland Improvement Company, originally amounted to three millions of dollars; and whereas, the same was from time to time reduced until, by virtue of an act of Assembly, approved March 17, 1859, the said capital stock was reduced to three hundred thousand dollars; and whereas, the said company have lately given out leases for certain veins of their coal lands which have hitherto not been mined, and it is proper that a portion of their capital should be restored to said company.

Resolved, *Be it enacted*, etc., that the capital stock of said company is hereby increased to one million eight hundred thousand dollars, and new certificates of stock shall issue to the present stockholders of the same number of shares that they now hold at the par value of \$10 per share. *Provided,* That the same company shall pay out of the Treasury one-half of one per cent on each increase of capital stock, in five annual payments, the first to be paid within one year after the passage of this act.

Sec. 2. That the Fulton Coal Company is hereby empowered to purchase and hold not exceeding one thousand acres of land, and to purchase and hold any other land in the middle anthracite coal field.

Sec. 3. That this act shall not take effect until its provisions are accepted by a majority of the stockholders of the company present at a meeting to be called for that purpose, at the discretion of the Board of Directors, and the said company shall give notice of such meeting, by publication in two daily newspapers in Philadelphia, each share of stock to be entitled to one vote, and the effect shall be in the office of the Secretary of State.

Mr. Nichols called up an act to incorporate the Eastern House Company, as follows:

Whereas, the President of the United States has deemed it necessary to issue another call for two hundred thousand men to aid in putting down the rebellion; and

Whereas, the people of Pennsylvania have, with characteristic liberality and patriotism, contributed, by taxation, nearly twenty-three millions of dollars to raise bonds to aid the United States in the late call for five hundred thousand men, which said taxes were principally raised upon real estate; therefore

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives, That the President of the United States be authorized to call for a bond of three hundred dollars for each volunteer to fill up the quota of the United States, under the President's call for two hundred thousand men, dated the 4th of March, 1864, and for the purpose of enabling the State to pay said bonds, the Governor and State Treasurer are hereby authorized to issue and sell bonds, to the amount of \$1,000,000, in five annual payments, the first to be paid on the 1st day of May and November in each year, and

for the purpose of providing for the redemption of the interest and creating a sinking fund to redeem said bonds at maturity, the Senate and House of Representatives be and they are authorized to report a bill fixing all railroads and canals in use or passing through the State, and all duties on passengers, coal, iron, and other products and merchandise carried on said roads and canals.

Bill Considered.—Mr. Clymer called up an act extending the provisions of an act relating to the appointment of Trustees in Philadelphia to the different counties of the State. *Passed.*

Mr. Connel called up an act to amend an act to encourage the manufacture of iron with coke or other mineral coal (enabling Pennsylvania corporations to hold lands out of the State). *Passed.*

The Senate went into executive session and read and the nomination of General John A. Smith, as Quartermaster-General on the ground staff of the militia; also, the nomination of Lewis H. Funk for Commissioner of Public Printing.

Mr. Connel called up an act authorizing the trustees of the Wm. Young Brothers' Ground to sell certain parcels thereof. This bill had been referred by the Governor to the Senate, and was not passed, and the bill passed.

Mr. Ridgway called up an act to incorporate the Philadelphia Silver and Copper Mining Company. *Passed.*

Mr. Smith called up an act incorporating the Plymouth Iron Company. *Passed.*

Mr. Connel called up an act to reduce the number of directors of the Harrisburg, Portsmouth, Mount Joy and Lancaster Railroad. *Passed.*

Mr. Connel called up a supplement to an act regulating the sale of intoxicating liquors in Philadelphia. This act reduces the license fee from fifty dollars to twenty-five. The measure of the bill was favored by Messrs. Connel and Nichols, and opposed by Messrs. Johnson, St. Clair and Specker. *Passed.*

The bill therefore failed to pass. *Adjourned till 3 o'clock.*

Adjourned Session.—The following bill passed: Incorporating the Northern Mining Company, an act to incorporate the Manufacturers' Mutual Insurance Company of Philadelphia. An act to incorporate the Oil Creek and Warren Transportation Company. An act to incorporate the Twelfth Street Market Company. A further supplement to an act to incorporate the Butler House Hotel Company, approved March 14, 1884. An act to exempt the Citizens' Volunteer Hospital of Philadelphia from taxation. A message was received from the Governor stating that the militia of September, 1883, would soon be paid. *Adjourned.*

Mr. Wimley moved that the House suspend the rules, and proceed to the consideration of an act incorporating the Plymouth Iron Company. *Agreed to.*

By Mr. Seagriff, joint resolutions relative to final adjustment. A motion was made that this House proceed to the consideration of the resolutions. *Not agreed to.*—yeas 29, nays 60.

By Mr. Berger, a supplement to an act to encourage manufacturing operations in this Commonwealth.

Section 1. Repeals the law as to advertising of the sources of revenue of the City of Philadelphia by the Controller.

Sec. 3. That the City of Philadelphia shall not hereafter publish the list of delinquent taxpayers.

Sec. 4. Provides for the filling of vacancies in Council.
