Heside the large load of cotton, consisting of 700 bales and 1,200 sacks, the Russell had, as freight, a number of mules, cattle, sheep and hogs, all of which perished in the flames or were drowned.

The crew of the gunboat (hername we regret not receiving) rendered efficient service, and the colored regiment stationed at Plaquemine was formed in line and employed in drenching the magazine situated on the bank in dangerous proximity to the burning boat, thus probably, saving the town itself from destruction. The excitement was not a little increased by the firing on our pickets from a band of guerillas auring the time the danger was at its height. They were, however, quickly dispersed through the vigulance of the commanding officers of the post.

PLECKADING FLEET, OPF MOBILE, Match 28—Although Admiral Farragut remained here with his fiect atterit was known that Sherman had returned to Vicksburg, engaging Fort Powell with his morar vessels and gunbeaus, there was perhaps no glimmer of hope in the breast of the old veteran that with these he could capture Mobile as he captured New Orleans. He could not pass the forts as he passed Forts Jackson and Philip, owing to the shallowness of the water and the nature of the obstructions placed in the channel in every direction.

CITY MORTALITY.—The number of interments CITY MORTALITY.—The number of interments in this city during the week ending Saturday was 356 a decrease of 6 from the previous week, and an increase of 75 over the same period last year. Of the whole number 187 were adults and 169 children, 64 being under one year of age; 185 were males, 171 females; 10 boys, 59 girls. The greatest number of deaths occurred in the Seventh Ward, being 35, and the smallest number in the Twenty-third Ward, where only two were reported. The principal causes of death were, casualties 9; croup, 11; consumption of the lungs, 37; convulsions, 161; malignant typhus fever, 7; typhoid fever, 161; inflammation of the lungs, 32; inflammation of the stomach and bowels, 6; and small-pox, 4.
